

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 31.—Colonel Thomas H. Flores, editor of a Democratic paper here, makes the following important political announcement to-day which is sent for what it is worth: First—that a most formidable, deeply laid plan has been developed here in regard to the coming contest for President.

Second—That many of the leading and influential Conservatives who have been firmly united to insure the defeat of General Grant, and have perfected arrangements so that within the next twenty days meetings will be held in Boston and elsewhere for the purpose of sending delegates to the Cincinnati convention.

Third—That ex-Governor Curtin, of Pennsylvania, who will return here within the next two weeks, having resigned his nomination to St. Louis, will be nominated next vice president, having been in training in France, through correspondence from the United States, for the past three months preparatory to the political race.

Fourth—That ex-Senator John W. McClure, whose election and admission to his seat is looked upon as a death blow to General Grant's re-election, will take the field against the administration.

Fifth—That ex-Representative in Congress Moorehead, of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, will also take the field against General Grant.

Sixth—That the State of Pennsylvania will, under the circumstances, certainly give 50,000 majority against the re-election of General Grant.

Seventh—That there will be but two electoral tickets in the field, and this result is thereby secured, as the high contracting parties have so determined.

Senator Wilson, on being informed to-day that the administration "pooled" the New York Labor Union demonstration, replied, "O, yes; they 'pooled' everything, and if they continue, they will 'pooled' themselves into the ground. I told them," said he, "that they could have avoided the whole thing by a little wisdom."

The dispatch from Cincinnati which says that a circular was issued on Friday, inviting the Republican Convention to meet at Cincinnati, also indicates that the delegates to Cincinnati, has been very generally misconstrued in the East to refer to the Liberal Republican convention there.

This is a mistake, it means a reform convention called in Cincinnati some time ago, which meets at the same time as the national Liberal Republican convention.

The leaders of the latter who are here say it will be composed of Democrats, Republicans and those who hope no Democrat will go there.

The leaders in the Cincinnati Liberal Republican convention declare to-night that ex-Governor Curtin, Colonel McClure, General Henry L. Pierce and Moorehead, of Pittsburgh, will form a part of the delegation from Pennsylvania.

Lawlessness in Mississippi.

This is a Washington dispatch to the Western papers of Monday.

General Emory has sent to the War Department a letter to Lieutenant and Aid-Camp King, dated New Orleans, March 6, saying that great lawlessness exists throughout the entire State of Mississippi, but it can't all be attributed to the Ku Klux organization. The trial of several prominent members of the gang, and the arrest of a large party from the vicinity of Corinth, and their confinement in the guard-house at Spring Springs, has done much toward their general disbandment; nevertheless there is a bitter and resentful spirit in every portion of the State against the federal government, and it is no doubt of the fact that when unsupported by the regular troops the authorities are denied, and their lives threatened by the desperadoes whom they are constantly called on to arrest.

Shanghaing, United States marshals for the Northern and Southern districts of Mississippi, respectively, and Wiley Wells, district attorney, are given as authority for the statement.

General Emory, in a letter dated March 8, says: Last month I went to Jackson to see Governor Powers, who had sent me a communication in which he requested that I am perfectly satisfied from that visit that these requisitions are well founded, and there is a necessity for more cavalry in that State; and always acting on the principle in the use of troops in civil affairs, that prevention is better than intervention, I respectfully request that I may be furnished with one more company of cavalry, to be posted in Mississippi. As a temporary expedient, I have directed a company of cavalry to be sent to New Orleans, and withdrawn one of the companies of cavalry in the northern district of Mississippi to post it in the southern district, where the Ku Klux organization is the most active, and the marshals to avoid all legal complications about the use of troops in making arrests and preventing order, I have arranged with the Governor in that district, between whom and the Governor there is the best understanding, that all requisitions shall be made by the United States civil officers; and I feel confident that the Governor will timely use of troops, to maintain order in that State without bringing the troops into collision with the citizens.

A Boarding House Tragedy.

Boston, March 31.—In a Boston boarding house on Friday, the wife of Thomas Williams, mechanic, who she had labored to support and nursed during a long and incurable illness, was found dead, apparently an overdose of laudanum, taken to quiet her nerves and procure rest. The husband was unable to render aid or call for assistance, and expired himself the next day. Mr. Williams is a native of Philadelphia, and had been living in New Orleans for some time, and was in the city at the time of the tragedy. The bodies were taken to Newport for burial.

The Albany Journal says:

For some two or three weeks past an advertisement has appeared in the Albany Journal, signed by Peter Grant, asking for information concerning his relatives. The advertisement set forth that he had left the city some thirty years ago, and proceeding to the Florida Islands, had a son located at Honolulu. Chief Maloy noticed the peculiarity of the advertisement, and, interesting himself in the matter, soon discovered that it was a hoax. He was not a native of New Orleans, and was not a member of the Albany Journal. He wrote, informing the Senator of the fact, at the same time detailing the circumstances which led him to think so, and has received a reply from Mr. Grant, stating that Peter Grant was in reality his brother, and also stating that he had written to him.

A Washington dispatch to the St. Louis Republican says:

The Secretary of State will inform Congress that it is impossible for this government to demand the release of Dr. Howard, whom the Cuban have sentenced to transportation to a penal colony, for the reason that an investigation shows that Howard swore allegiance to Spain many years ago, and, though a native of Philadelphia, has resided in Cuba twenty-five years. An appeal of humane character, however, will be made for Howard's release.

An Arizona paper calls the following statement of interest: "An Amusing Account. We think our readers will agree with me decidedly." "Near Weaver Station William McFarland was found murdered and horribly mutilated. American residents suspected a Mexican man of having killed McFarland, pursued him and shot him on sight. The Mexican's friends then killed one of the shooting party. This precipitated a riot, resulting in the death of McFarland. No. 5 fortified himself in another house, which was blown up and its inmate shot."

LAW OF THE STATE OF LOUISIANA

PUBLISHED BY AUTHORITY.

AN ACT No. 14.

To provide a revenue, and grant and collect licenses, to prescribe certain penalties and to amend and re-enacted as to the peace, State and parish officers, and to repeal all acts inconsistent herewith.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana in General Assembly convened, That there shall be levied and collected an annual amount as a license tax as follows:—

First—From each male inhabitant over the age of twenty-one years, not attached to the army or navy of the United States, the sum of one dollar, ninety per cent of which shall be appropriated exclusively to the support of the public schools, and the balance placed in the State treasury to the credit of the Charity Hospital fund.

Second—From each wholesale or retail dealer in goods, wares, or merchandise, from each importer or dealer in bar stores, one hundred dollars; from each and every retail merchant, fifteen dollars.

Third—From each keeper of a warehouse, or of any public storage for hire, fifty dollars; from each keeper of a livery stable, sale stable or yard, or livery and sale stable, with stable or yard, in which are kept horses or mules, twenty-five dollars; for every public hack, twenty-five dollars.

Fourth—From each proprietor or proprietor of a distillery, except distilleries used exclusively in distilling from fruit or turpentine, three hundred dollars; from each proprietor or manufacturer of cordials, liquors, wines or syrups, one hundred dollars; from each proprietor of a distillery from fruit or turpentine exclusively, and for the keeper or proprietor of a brewery, fifty dollars; provided, that no license shall be required from any person who may be exempted from this act by the laws of the State.

Fifth—From each proprietor or keeper of every billiard saloon, bowling alley or pistol gallery in which there is but one table, fifty dollars; for every other table, where there are two tables, alleys or targets, forty dollars; where there are more than two tables, alleys or targets, two dollars additional on each table, alley or target, for every table, alley or target.
