Local Intelligence.

PHOENIX HOMICIDE.—At six o'clock yesterday morning Corporal Meuck received information that a man was lying in the yard of No. 174 Tchoupitoulas street, unconscious from wounds. The sufferer, whose name was not ascertained, was sent to the General Hospital, where he died four hours after he was received.
