CONGRESS.

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FOREIGN.

Australia Wool Crop Decreased—Cotton and Sugar Crops Promising—The Spanish Cortes—Threatened Resignation—Departure of Rechefer and Other Convicts—The Lower Branch of a German Lloyd Steamship—Ere King Louis Philippe's Remains—Expulsion to Inter them in France—Capture of a Schooner by a Spanish Gunboat—The Nova Scotia Giantess—Her Accouchement.

SYDNEY, Australia, May 14.—The wool crop of last season shows a large deficit. Cotton and sugar crops promise well.

MADRID, May 23.—At the session to-day of Congress, the lower branch, recon Cortes, Senor Sagasta stated that in consequence of the publicity given to documents relative to the secret funds of the government, he would resign.

PARIS, May 23.—President Thiers has given his permission for the remains of King Louis Philippe, to be brought from England and interred at Dreux.

RECHEFER, whose departure for New Caledonia has been delayed, will sail to-morrow for that island, together with several other persons who have been convicted of participating in the revolution.

At twelve o'clock last night, when the Baltimore was in the bay, a heavy storm came in collision with an unknown steamer, and had a hole eighteen feet long and seven feet wide stove in her hull.

The water poured in rapidly and extinguished the lights on board, before the steamer had been run aground.

The coast guards at Hastings immediately came to the relief of the distressed vessel, and succeeded in saving the passengers and crew, and landed them in safety.

When the Baltimore went ashore she ran on a rock, and it is probable will go to pieces.

HAVANA, May 23.—The Spanish gunboat Destello captured the English schooner William Juliana at Savanna Lamar, and brought her to the port of Havana, where she was captured under suspicious circumstances, and is detained for investigation.

MEXICO.

MATAMORAS, Mexico, May 23.—For the last few days the revolutionists have appeared in small parties in the vicinity of Camargo, which is the headquarters of the government forces.

Yesterday the revolutionists attacked the General Ceballos' outpost, and were repulsed with a loss of several killed and wounded.

It is reported that a small party of men belonging to the force lately commanded by Cortina pronounced and joined the revolutionists.

It is said to be near Monterey, and Quirago near Corral, both of whom are recruiting their forces.

MISCELLANEOUS.

TORNADO NEAR CINCINNATI—Quarter of a Mile in Width—Killed Several—Road—Arkansas Republican Convention—Greene and Brown Indebted—Presbyterian General Assemblies at Richmond and Detroit—Music for Boston Jubilee—Base Ball at the Hub—Baltimore and Potomac Railroad—Furness Honoree for New Orleans—Tolosa Trotting.

PHILADELPHIA, May 23.—A Union League meeting, held here for the purpose of organizing for the campaign, adopted resolutions including Grant as a committee of twenty-five was appointed to conduct the campaign.

SPRINGFIELD, May 23.—A conference of Liberty Republicans called a State convention to meet June 26.

In the Republican State Convention, which assembled yesterday, every county in the State was represented. Stephen L. Logan was elected permanent secretary. Ex-Governor Oglesby was nominated for Governor and General J. L. Beveridge for Lieutenant Governor.

Resolutions were adopted in favor of equal rights before the law and modified States rights. Delegates to Philadelphia were instructed to vote for Grant, oppose unconstitutional legislation for the cure of the disorders of society, and demand equal rights and duty for every human being.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., May 23.—The Democratic caucus in this city elected Greely delegates to the congressional district convention.

DETROIT, May 23.—The Presbyterian Assembly adopted a resolution for a committee of fifteen on benevolence and finance, with headquarters in New York. The treasurer of this committee shall be the treasurer of the board of home missions.

The report on foreign missions was adopted.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., May 23.—The Democratic district convention held here to-day nominated for Congress Hon. Thomas S. Ashe, of Anson county; adopted resolutions including Grant as a committee of twenty-five was appointed to conduct the campaign.
