GENERAL LONGSTREET INTERVIEWED

Will Support the Cincinnati Nominees

THE CINCINNATI CANDIDATES

THE TRUE REPUBLICANS

Among the distinguished gentlemen

whose views on public questions are of singular

interest to the community, those of General

Longstreet are now more than ordinary

importance. We shall make no apology,

therefore, in submitting them to the public.

Calling upon the General yesterday, we obtained

his views of the political situation,

which he proceeded to give in a frank,

clear, and explicit manner.

Reporter—General, I should like to get your

opinion of the Cincinnati nominees

with reference to their identity with the

Republican party.

General Longstreet—In my opinion the

Cincinnati nominees are true Republicans.

I shall proceed to demonstrate this proposition

by assuming that the reconstruction laws,

the acts of Republican legislation, are

concededly the work of the Republican

State of Louisiana for illustration. The

constitution requires that the United States

shall guarantee to every State in this Union

a republican form of government. This

statute not only recognizes the State

governments, but commands the enforce-

ment in every State of a republican

form of government. It is the duty of the

United States to see that this duty is

fulfilled. The authority and power of the

reconstruction measures of Congress. These

measures recognize the State governments

in the authority from which they spring;

and in the process of their execution they

acknowledge their recognition of the State

governments as a necessary unit in the great

Republican system, and they concede that

the authority over the States is limited to a

specific purpose.

President Johnson by virtue of his high

official authority, and upon his individual

responsibility, undertook a plan of recon-

struction, but it was condemned by Con-

gress and the people because it was with-

out the sanction of law. We find, there-

fore, that popular opinion and Republican

doctrine established the rule that State gov-

ernments can not be molested or subverted

except by law under constitutional provi-

sion. It follows, therefore, that reconstructed

Republican laws, restored to a republican

form of government, accepted by a Republican

Congress, the Southern States must have

been republican at the time of their restora-

tion and rehabilitation as integral parts

of that Union, and that no one can deny,

since changed their governments must still

be republican.

Louisiana, one of the States reconstructed

under Republican legislation, and having

the same government that she had when

received into the community of States, with

equal privileges and immunities, must have

been republican in her government when

she was received into the community of

States, and she has remained republican

to this day. If she was not republican

when she was received into the community

of States, she would not have been

received into the community of States.

But if she was republican when she was

received into the community of States,

she has remained republican to this day.

Therefore, the Cincinnati nominees are

true Republicans, and I shall support

them as such.
