JEALOUSY AND ATTEMPTED MURDER.

A Woman's Revenge—Pearl Rivers Shot by a Divorced Woman.

The upper part of the First District was yesterday afternoon thrown into a state of great excitement by the particulars of a most outrageous and murderous attack upon Pearl Rivers, the newly wedded wife of A. M. Holbrook, Esq., who is now lying at the point of death.

About twenty minutes before the attack was made, a closely veiled woman, subsequently ascertained to be Jennie Bronson, was seen standing on the corner of Orange and Constance streets, looking toward Magazine street, evidently expecting the arrival of some one.

The house is one of a row, is two stories in height, placed somewhat back from the street, with a handsome garden in front, the arbor on the lower floor, projecting into a bay window.

While she was struggling with the servant, Pearl Rivers darted down the stairs and out of the house like a flash, and into the house of Mr. Rainey, calling on the family for God's sake to protect her.

As an evidence of their boldness, we are told that while two of the policemen were in the yard of the besieged house, and another with the gentleman in the yard from which the missiles seemed to come, a piece of brick was thrown, striking one of the officers in the face.

When the excitement was all over and Pearl found herself among friends, physicians were sent for, the first being Dr. Nicholson, who said there was no danger but Dr. Stille was also called, and by this time the reaction from the flash of terror had set in, and the poor young lady lay prostrate in a state of absolute torpor.
