REGULAR MEETING. The Council was called to order in regular session at 12 M.

Present—Mayor B. F. Flinders (presiding), and Administrators John Cockrem (Improvements), Alfred Shaw (Public Accounts), L. T. Delassize (Waterworks and Public Buildings), F. C. Remick (Commerce), James Lewis (Police), John S. Walton (Finance), and H. Bonzano (Assessments).

Department Reports, etc. Resolved, That the Administrator of Waterworks and Public Buildings be and he is hereby authorized to advertise in the official journals for proposals for the rebuilding of the wing of the Sorapuru Market.

Adopted. By Mr. Delassize: Resolved, That the Administrator of Finance be and he is hereby directed to issue new consolidated bonds, drainage series, at par, in settlement of the following claim:

Watt Divine, transferee of J. J. O'Hara, for wooden revetment on the lake shore, on account, \$500.00. Adopted. Mr. Walton voting no.

An ordinance for the payment of a number of bills of J. T. Hamlin, laid over since September 3, was called up and adopted. Mr. Shaw voting no.

Resolved, That the Administrator of Public Accounts be, and he is hereby authorized to issue a certificate of appropriation in favor of J. H. Conroy, for the sum of \$700, in compromise of claims for money expended by him; provided, said certificate and amount herein specified be in full settlement of said claim.

Mr. Walton opposed the resolution. He said Mr. Conroy's original claim was three or four thousand dollars. It was referred to him (Mr. Walton), and he could get no evidence whatever that the claim had any foundation in justice, and so he reported, and the report was accepted. Mr. Conroy then sued the city for the amount and had obtained judgment for only \$350, which was paid him. Then the bill came back to the Council in some way for the original amount after being rejected by the Council and rejected by the courts, and now it came up again in the shape of a \$700 compromise.

Mr. Shaw expressed an opinion that the judgment of the court did not dispose of the whole claim; that it counted virtually to a nonsuit with respect to all the claim except \$250. He thought something was due to the officer of Mayor Every Mayor of the city incurred expenditures for which it would be impossible to produce vouchers.

Mr. Walton said he had investigated all the circumstances, and had come to the conclusion that this money never was disbursed. Mr. Conroy, in fact, had never to him asserted that it had been; he only urged that he had a claim for this amount under the agreement with the Council. The chairman of the late finance committee assured him (Mr. Walton) that there was no ground for the claim.

A similar ordinance, providing for the settlement for digging Poydras street canal, read twice and printed September 17, 1872, was called up and adopted.

Resolved, That the use of the public squares and places belonging to the city will not be granted to exhibitions or entertainments of any kind.

Resolved, That the use of Lyceum Hall will not be granted to any purpose requiring fees of admission, unless the proceeds be entirely devoted to benevolent or charitable objects.

It was stated that the use of Tivoli circle and Congo square had already been granted by the Mayor and several Administrators for a rental of \$100 a day.

The resolution was indefinitely postponed, and on motion of Mr. Bonzano the action of the Mayor and Administrators was approved.

Resolved, That the Administrator of Public Accounts warrant on the Administrator of Finance in favor of P. B. Fouke, administrator of the estate of H. Freshbury, for the sum of \$500 in city appropriation certificates, being the equivalent of \$266 25 in currency, to satisfy judgment of court in the case of straightening Magnolia street.

Also, J. M. Larocque, judgment of the Fourth District Court, for opening St. David street, \$1650 in appropriation certificates.

Adopted. Mr. Walton and Mr. Shaw voting no. Mr. Lewis called up a resolution for the removal of the foundry at No. 75 Orleans street.
