Local Intelligence. INQUEST IN THE LEVY MURDER.—Corporal Creagh yesterday began taking testimony in the case of the murder of Captain Barnes. John Zeller witnessed most of the riotous conduct of the longshoremen strikers on the seventeenth instant. He saw a colored man fire the first shot, and saw some one strike deceased with a boat pole; saw deceased when he stood on the gang plank, holding a hatchet warning off the crowd, he saying he would die before he would be frightened off by a mob. He also saw one of the mob rushing off the barge, his face bloody.

DISCHARGED.—Mr. Thayer, who was before the Criminal Court, charged by Fou Loy with larceny of \$7000, was discharged. District Attorney Luzeburg abandoned the suit. It was intimated that the Celestial Fou Loy swore to something more than the truth, and he will probably be prosecuted for perjury.
