By direction of his excellency the Governor, I have the honor to transmit herewith, for the information of the General Assembly, the report of the State Treasurer of receipts and expenditures for the year 1872.

Mr. Herwig, chairman of the Committee on Finance, reported the following bill as a substitute for Senate bill No. 48.

A bill to be entitled an act directing the State Treasurer to suspend, and prohibiting the registration of all warrants and certificates of indebtedness issued in accordance with law.

By unanimous consent the substitute was taken up and passed first reading.

On motion of Mr. Harris, the constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote, the bill read the second time and considered engrossed.

Under a further suspension of the constitutional rule, the bill passed its third reading, and was finally adopted with its title.

Mr. Alexander, chairman of the Committee on Federal Relations, reported favorably upon the following Senate joint resolutions.

Senate joint resolution No. 1, requesting the President and Congress of the United States to restore the use and property of the Branch Mint to the city of New Orleans, to be used as a State House, and for city purposes.

Lies over under the rules.

Senate joint resolution No. 2, joint resolution authorizing the Governor to contract with the city of New Orleans, or other authority, for the use as a State House of the branch Mint in the city of New Orleans, or part thereof.

Mr. Wharton, chairman of the Committee on Retrenchment and Reform, reported favorably on House bill No. 11, an act repealing the act creating a commission to erect a State House.

Lies over under the rules.

Also favorably on Senate bill No. 22, an act punishing extortion in office by the public officers.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS. A bill to be entitled an act to confer certain additional jurisdiction on the parish courts, to regulate certain proceedings in the parish courts, and to fix the terms of said courts.

The bill was read the first time. The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote, the bill read a second time, and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Mr. Ingraham: A bill to be entitled an act to amend and re-enact sections two and three of an act entitled an act to incorporate the Louisiana Workingmen's Homeless Association, approved January 15, 1872.

The bill was read the first time. The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote, the bill read a second time and referred to the Committee on Charitable Institutions.

Mr. Wharton called up House bill No. 11, entitled an act repealing the act creating a commission to erect a State House.

By unanimous consent, the bill was taken up and read.

Mr. Wharton moved its adoption on second reading.

Mr. Harris moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Parks and Public Buildings.

Mr. Wharton moved to lay the motion to refer on the table.

The question then recurring on the motion to refer, the bill was referred to the Committee on Parks and Public Buildings by the following vote, on a roll for the year and days: Yeas—Anderson, Alexander, Barber, Blackburn, Butler, Burch, Brewster, Greene, Harris, P. F. Herwig, Harper, Ingraham, Kelso, Masciot, Pollard, Sypher, Thomas, Williams, Wharton—19.

Nays—None.

Laid over, and ordered to be printed in the Journal.

Also, Mr. Burch, by unanimous consent, offered the following:

Resolved, That for the purpose of protecting the interest of the State, the Committee on Railroads and Internal Improvements of the Senate be and they are hereby directed to investigate into the affairs of said company, with a view to ascertain if the company complied with their charter and obligations to the State, and to report to this Senate the result of their investigation by bill, resolution or otherwise; and that for the purpose of carrying into effect the intent of this resolution, the committee be and they are hereby authorized to employ an expert, to be paid such amount as agreed upon, out of the contingent fund of the Senate.

The resolution was read. Mr. Sypher moved to insert after the word "authorized" the words "to send for persons and papers."

Mr. Brewster declared himself opposed to the employment of an expert as a needless expense, and made a motion to strike out all after the words "to send for persons and papers."

The resolution as amended was then adopted.

Mr. Harris called up Senate bill No. 47, a bill to be entitled an act to provide for and regulate the clerical force in the Auditor's office, to fix their salaries, and to provide for the manner and conditions under which the chief clerk can act as Auditor, and for other purposes.

Reported favorably by the Committee on Judiciary.

The constitutional rule was then suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote, the bill read a second time, and considered engrossed, and, under a further suspension of the constitutional rule, passed third reading, and was finally adopted with its title.

Reported the first time and lies over under the rules.

Executive session having been raised, on motion of Mr. Burch the Senate voted to adjourn until to-morrow at the usual hour.

The President then announced that the Senate stood adjourned till Friday, January 24, 1873, at twelve o'clock M.

OFFICIAL JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

REGULAR SESSION. THE THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF LOUISIANA.

Fifteenth Day's Session. SENATE CHAMBER, New Orleans, January 24, 1873.

The Senate met pursuant to adjournment, and was called to order by Hon. C. C. Anderson, Lieutenant Governor of the State and President of the Senate.

On call of the roll the following Senators answered to their names: Messrs. Barber, Blackburn, Blunt, Butler, Greer, Harris, P. F. Herwig, Harper, Ingraham, Kelso, Masciot, Pollard, Sypher, Thomas, Williams, Wharton—19.

The President of the Senate announced a quorum present.

Prayer by the Chaplain. Reading of the minutes of yesterday's proceedings was dispensed with, and the President announced that the journal stood approved, the same having been corrected.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES. Mr. Anderson, chairman of the Committee on Judiciary, reported favorably on the following bills, viz: House bill No. 14, an act to fix the terms of the Third Judicial District Court of the State of Louisiana.

Senate bill No. 47, a bill to be entitled an act to provide for and regulate the clerical force in the Auditor's office, to fix their salaries, and to provide for the manner and conditions under which the chief clerk can act as Auditor, and for other purposes.

Mr. Sypher asked unanimous consent to take up House bill No. 14, reported favorably.

The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote, and the bill passed a second reading, and the bill passed a third reading, and was finally adopted with its title.

Under a further suspension of the constitutional rule, the bill passed a third reading, and was finally adopted with its title.

Mr. Kelso, chairman of the Committee on Corporations and Parochial Affairs, submitted the following report on Senate bill No. 23:

Your Committee on Corporations, to whom was referred Senate bill No. 23, an act to amend and re-enact an act entitled an act to incorporate the Crescent City Gas-light Company, etc., beg leave to report favorably, with the following amendments:

In line seven of title, written bill, strike out the words "reduce their capital stock," also, in lines fifteen, sixteen, seventeen, eighteen, nineteen and twenty seven, strike out the words "and vice president," and in line twenty-eight, strike out the word "and," and in the same line strike out the word "vice president," and in line sixty-one, after the word "thereto," insert "provided that nothing in this act shall effect the charter heretofore granted to the Jefferson City Gas-light Company."

And your committee further recommend that the title be amended so as to strike out the words "to reduce their capital stock."

With the above amendments we respectfully recommend the passage of the bill.

The bill was read the first time. The constitutional rule was then suspended, the bill read a second time, considered engrossed, and, under a further suspension of the constitutional rule, the bill was read the third time and finally passed with its title.

On motion of Mr. Barber the Senate voted to adjourn until Monday next at the usual hour.

The President then announced that the Senate stood adjourned till Monday, January 27, 1873, at twelve o'clock M.
