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for hours. The fire has extended to the mountains, and along the line of the Alexandria and the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad. The latter will lose heavily in wood and buildings.

MOBILE, April 9.—The fire department of this city, composed of five companies, seven with steamers, and two hook and ladder companies, celebrated their thirty-fifth anniversary to-day. The display was beautiful. The weather, though threatening early in the morning, cleared off, giving them a delightful day.

ATLANTA, Ga., April 9.—The Georgia State Medical Association met to-day. There was a large attendance.

PROVIDENCE, April 9.—The western bound train has returned, the Central road being impassable.

The gas took fire and the mill building was immediately enveloped in flames and totally destroyed.

Two hundred men were working under the roof when it fell, but only one was killed. Several others were sustained by the timbers, but will not likely, however, prove fatal. Total loss, \$200,000; insurance, \$190,000.
