MADRID, May 30.—Admiral Topete has been released.

Lisbon, May 30.—The steamer Saragosa, from South America, has arrived, and brings dates from Rio to the eleventh.

The budget of the Brazilian Ministry of Finance reports a surplus of \$3,147,720.

A revolution had broken out at Entre Rios, in the province of Entre Rios, in the public. Lopez Jordana was at the head of the rebels. He took possession of the towns of Quilil, Quil, Victoria and Colon, but subsequently met with a check at the hands of the government. Cincinnati, May 30.—The Ministerial Conference of the New Jerusalem Church of the United States met here to-day.

Rev. George Field, of Toronto, Canada, read a paper on the proper form of the hands of the religious worship. The conference will continue several days.

Boston, May 30.—The Mutuals defeated the Bostonians at base ball by a score of 10 to 1.

At a session of the National Agricultural Congress the debate was renewed upon the report of the committee on miscellaneous subjects in regard to the proposed eight-hour law passed by the federal Congress, and quite a variety of views were expressed, the result being that no definite action was had.

The question of transportation was discussed at considerable length, the general idea prevailing that the rates of transportation are exorbitant, and that relief should be found through some other means than the question is, how is it to be obtained?

The majority of the convention appear to be decidedly opposed to bringing about any antagonism with the railroads, and are in favor of the country, preferring to harmonize the interests of the producer and carrier.

The subject of pomology was brought up, and delegates were appointed to attend the meeting of the American Pomological Society at Boston.

The committee on the railway system reported a series of resolutions, which were unanimously adopted, and the views of almost the entire Congress, and evince a conciliatory disposition on the part of the convention.

Vice-presidents for all the States represented were selected for the current year, and a provision was made for the publication and distribution of a large number of copies of the report of the convention.

General W. H. Jackson, of Tennessee, was chosen president, and Charles W. Greene was re-elected secretary.

Atlanta was selected as the place for the next meeting, to be held on the second Wednesday in May, 1874.

San Francisco, May 30.—An unknown Chinaman was murdered last night. There are reports of a riot in the city, and the Chinese are greatly alarmed, and have closed their theatres and stores.
