CINCINNATI, June 9.—In the general convention of the New Jerusalem Church to-day, the committee reported that the ordaining ministers shall be consecrated by order of the general convention, upon the application of the committee.

The treasurer was directed to make the annual assessment on the various bodies represented in the convention, for defraying its expenses.

NEWBURG, N. Y., June 9.—A fire on First street commenced in William G. Moller & Co.'s storehouse, and spread to the large Newburg. The fire extended northward, and the coal yard of D. S. Warding, the barrel and building were destroyed.

The warehouse of Edwin T. Skidmore is now burning, and the fire threatens to damage the entire river front of the city. The damage to the river front cannot be less than \$500,000.

The mayor has telegraphed to Pittsburgh for help.

Later.—The fire is now under control. The large Newburg is drifting down the river and still burning with a large cargo. The following property has been destroyed: W. O. Moller & Co.'s warehouse and a wooden "factory" building, which was a barrel factory, property owned by James W. Taylor, Daniel S. Waring's coal yard, and several other buildings.

The estimated amount of loss and insurance can not be ascertained to-night. The total loss is estimated at \$250,000.

Skidmore's storehouse was considerably damaged. The cause of the fire is unknown. Several passengers were rescued from a large Newburg in small boats. One lady jumped overboard, but was rescued.

LATER.—Alexander Palace is entirely destroyed. Seven lives lost. The loss by
