Local Intelligence.

Only one of the Municipal Police Judges have as yet made any return of fines collected last week. The walls of the first story of the new engine house for Mississippi Fire Company No. 2 are up and commencement made on the second story. Board of School Directors.

Present—Judge Dibble, presiding, and Messrs. Longstreet, McConnell, DeKlyne, Brodhead, Rey, Carey, McCarty, Boothby, Thompson, Clark and Gardner.

This was a called meeting. Mr. A. W. Brodhead took his seat to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of General Bussey.

Mr. Brodhead assumes the places on the several committees filled by his predecessor. Mr. Brown, State Superintendent of Education, made a formal statement of the credit of the school in the Fourth District High School, and Mrs. Shaw also handed in a written statement of the affairs.

By resolution, "for effect," it was understood that the teachers shall be paid during vacation. On motion of Judge Dibble, the schools will be opened on the second Monday in September.

The board then went into executive session on a report of the committee on teachers. During the executive session the subject of the reception given State Superintendent Brown by Mrs. Shaw, principal of the upper high school, was considered. Considerable discussion was indulged in by all the members present. Messrs. Longstreet and DeKlyne retired, when the board went into secret session. After the discussion a vote was taken on the question, and Mrs. Shaw was dismissed from her position from this date.

PUSHING THE INCENDIARIES.—Last evening an informal investigation was held in the court of Justice Laroche, when the case of Jacob Lotz was attended to. On the night of the eighth of June, a fire occurred in the building at the corner of Annunciation and Eighth streets, occupied by Lotz as a grocery and coffeehouse. He had an insurance for \$1000 on the Mercantile and \$400 on stock and \$400 on the furniture. After the fire appraisers were appointed to learn the damage, it was ascertained that the injured goods were worth about \$2000, his goods were worth \$500 or \$600 and the furniture worth \$300. Detective Dumas has been looking after this case and unaccountably after the fire occurred, and although the evidence seems to back his assertion, Lotz is under arrest, and before his trial is over will think that lighting detectives and insurance offices is an unprofitable business.
