SENATOR WEST ON UNIFICATION.

HIS LETTER TO H. BONZANO, ESQ. The following letter from Senator West has already been briefly noticed by telegraph.

WASHINGTON, June 23, 1873. DEAR SIR:—I have, from you, as well as from a number of other friends in Louisiana, touching the political situation, together with the current comments of what is called the opposition journals, have prepared me somewhat for the attempt toward a new distraction of the Republican party in our State.

There are the wrongs done and admitted by the Democrats; wrongs of prejudice, intolerance, outrage and oppression. Without any such high sounding man as you, could, long ere this, have repented of their aims and have joined the Republican party, the party that accords all these rights, and upholds the rights of man, as well as the rights of the colored race.

Let these gentlemen who are desirous of attaining the "surest way to preserve all the blessings of life, liberty and property" to Louisiana join in with the well disposed of the Republican party, and keep the management of the party out of unworthy hands, and no more shall be heard of the "unnatural division among the children of her soil and her oppression."

It is with the deference to the views of the colored people, and sincere men, colored and white, who participated in the proceedings of the meeting, that I have written this letter. It is not intended to offend any one, but to show the power to command, purify it and redeem the State.

Now, how have the whites, forming a majority of the population, been divided? The colored population that is generally better educated, conducted the masses toward the well-being of the whole people. By far the larger proportion of the white Republicans have been merely using the colored voters as instrumentalities toward their temporary aggrandizement.

Board of Health.

Reports of the Smithsonian Institute and other documents and books had been presented. On communications on the subject of cholera Dr. White stated that he had written that the disease had entirely disappeared from the city.

WASHINGTON.

LONDON, June 27.—The Daily News reports that the Russian commission for the development of commerce in Asia propose an extension of the Pahl and Bifarra railway to Baker, a Russian town on the western shore of the Caspian sea, and then to Tehran, the capital of Persia.

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THE CHOLERA.

Twenty Deaths in Nashville—Six Deaths in Cincinnati—Nash Deaths in Memphis. NASHVILLE, June 27.—Twenty deaths from cholera in Nashville, Tenn., on Wednesday, and the disease is abating.

CINCINNATI, June 27.—Six deaths of cholera occurred to-day. There were nine cholera cases in Cincinnati on Wednesday. There are comparatively few new cases reported.

THE TURF.

PHILADELPHIA, June 27.—In the trotting race at Point Breeze, the event of the first day, the race was between Hotspur and Lady Maid, mile heat, best three in five, in harness, was won by three straight heats by Hotspur. Time—2:30, 2:37, 2:38.

EAST SAGINAW, Mich., June 27.—In the 2:50 race to-day, of the thirteen entries, but five started. The race was won by Belle in three straight heats. Time—2:54, 2:54, 2:54.
