The Mexican Claims Commission. The following interesting information touching this matter was telegraphed from Washington Sunday evening: Mr. Zamacoia, the new Mexican commissioner, and Mr. Kolla, the new Mexican agent, have arrived at New York, bringing the confirmed treaty between the United States and the Mexican republic for the revival of the Mexican claims commission, and it may be expected that at an early day the business of that commission will be resumed. This commission was established under Mr. Seward's treaty of February 1, 1847, which expired in February, 1853, and has been extended for two years from that time. Neither government seems to have appreciated the number and magnitude of the claims, for the examination of which the period originally fixed by that treaty was wholly insufficient. A large number of claims of citizens of the United States against Mexico, filed with the commission in 1817, and the whole number of claims is about 200,000. CHERRY'S CHALLENGE. Mr. F. Ubbasy publishes the following: Being on the eve of my departure for France, I beg leave to announce to the public that I will be back on the fifteenth of October next.

Moreover, I declare that from October 15, 1873, to June 15, 1874, the disposition of the United States, and that be the disposition of any billiard player (champions included) for a match of 1000 points for \$500 a side, or more at the option of my opponent, on condition that the match be played on two consecutive evenings (500 points each evening), receipts over expenses to go to the winner, and in order to give both players the satisfaction of the match, the balls to be weighed and washed in each contest in presence of both players and the audience and no choice of balls for the second evening, each player having the right of choice of the preceding evening—as is customary in matches between professors.

French Intervention. The Philadelphia Bulletin takes the view that follows of the intervention of France in the affairs of Louisiana: The following appears in the New York World as a genuine telegraphic dispatch from its "own correspondent" at New Orleans: "NEW ORLEANS, June 18.—Under the treaty made between Thomas Jefferson and Napoleon the Great, in view of our outraged MacMahon, being induced by the Academics of New Englanders and the British, it was specifically agreed that the inhabitants of Louisiana (whether the Acadians, French, or otherwise) should be free to profess any person, property or religion. This third section was written by Napoleon himself, and it is now proposed, in view of the faithful wrongs to which the people of Louisiana are subjected because of the domination of thieves and savage blacks, to assert the rights defined under this treaty and invoke the intervention of France, in order to have the treaty carried out in its spirit and intention, and to have the appeal of Louisianians to have patient and careful consideration."

All the nonsensical things that have appeared lately in Democratic organs, this certainly takes the lead. If any man believes in it he must be a hopeless ass. The idea of French intervention in Louisiana is, of itself, utterly absurd. But even if it were not, France has no right to meddle with her own hand, and President MacMahon must be imbued with much more than ordinary ambition, as well as much more than ordinary silliness, if he should think for a moment of meddling with any part of this country.
