REPLY TO MR. JAMES JACKSON. In regard to the card published in yesterday's issue of the Herald, signed by Mr. Jackson, president of the New Orleans Gas Company, a stockholder in the Crescent City Gas Company desires to warn your readers against the spreading of this kind of news under which Mr. Jackson labors, in the following particulars:

1. The act recently signed by Governor Kellogg, and which it appears Mr. Jackson made such great efforts to prevent this signing, is an amendatory act reducing and limiting the franchises and powers granted by the original charter of the Crescent City Gas Company. Governor Kellogg, in signing it, is an amendatory act reducing and limiting the franchises and powers granted by the original charter of the Crescent City Gas Company.

2. Mr. Jackson is in grave error in charging the object of this bill to be to confiscate the property of the New Orleans Gas Company. The present stockholders of the Crescent City Gas Company, who desire to possess the property of the old gas company, for several reasons:

1. Because they propose to construct a great deal better and more efficient works than the old. 2. Because they know that after the first of April, 1875, their property in the city of New Orleans, under the forty-second section of the charter of 1852, will be sold to the highest bidder. 3. The clause in the amendatory act which Mr. Jackson thinks would have the effect of confiscating the property of the New Orleans Gas Company, is the clause which extends the charter of the company for twenty years—resulted from the plea set up by this company and the decision of the Supreme Court thereon. A act was brought to determine the constitutionality of that act of 1869, but the company, whose interest it was to meet and have that question decided, urged the propriety of such a suit, as the act had not gone into effect.
