NEW YORK. THE WAR PATH. The Colorado Indians on the War Path.—Outrages and Depredations Committed. St. Louis, October 10.—A letter dated Pueblo, Colorado, October 5, says that September 28 a party of some 300 Indians, consisting of Cheyennes, Arapahoes and Kiowas, came into the Arkansas valley from the south and camped opposite Fort Lyon, near Los Animas. The commanding officer at Fort Lyon had a talk with the chiefs, but could learn nothing of the intentions of the Indians. They claimed the country as their own, and they proposed to roam over it as they pleased.

A Carli's Victory Claimed.
