MISCELLANEOUS. Meeting of Workmen. Chicago, December 22.—A meeting of the workmen was held last night. The resolutions adopted last night were made, urging employment by the city when other chances of work failed, otherwise the city should supply necessities.

Strikers Suppressed by the Police. The striking longshoremen marched along Delaware avenue, stopping at each wharf where men were at work, and where persuasion failed, threats were made to stop the men from working.

Incendiary Boys. Albany, December 22.—Five or six boys, their ages ranging from fifteen to eighteen, have been arrested near Schenectady, on a charge of incendiarism.

Indiana and Monte Dea in Nebraska. Omaha, December 22.—General Orr, commanding the Department of the Platte, received a telegram Saturday evening from Fort Laramie stating that several parties of Indians were killing and robbing the cattle of Scott's Bluffs and Horse Creek.

Confidence and Monte Dea are operating the passengers on the Union Pacific. He immediately ordered orders to the commanders at Fort Laramie and Sidney Barracks to send scouting parties out after these Indians, to scout the country on and between Laramie, Fort and Scott's Bluffs.
