DEBATES IN THE HOUSE. Eighth Days' Proceedings. NEW ORLEANS, January 15, 1874.

Mr. Speaker—I wish to say a few words by way of personal explanation. The city news of the last Saturday published an Associated Press dispatch from Washington, to this effect: "Innocent purchasers of Louisiana securities are represented as being suffering some action on the part of the government for protection. They claim that Kellogg has proclaimed the State bankrupt."

Mr. Speaker—I was not in Washington on Friday last, and had no private information or communication from there which would enable me to answer your question. I do not know the dispatch to be false as a matter of fact, but I am at all times a difficult matter to be positive as to the accuracy of the news. In this case it was particularly so, because of the circumstances—the time and the distance.

Mr. Speaker—I am not attacking the gentleman in any way, but I am expressing my right of reply, and that the gentleman is not in his seat is no fault of mine. When a gentleman comes into this House to create a disturbance, it is his duty to designate what it all means. I am not here to defend Governor Kellogg; his acts speak for themselves.

Mr. Speaker—Probably the gentleman can give the amendments, so that the House can be put in possession of them now. Mr. Wands—Sections sixteen and seventeen in the bill reported are stricken out.

Mr. Speaker—The gentleman will please pay attention to the Chair, and not to the amendments. Mr. Wands, chairman of the committee, tells me they consist in the striking out of sections sixteen and seventeen.
