THE SENATE YESTERDAY

Thirty-first Day's Session. Senate, February 11, 1874. The Senate met pursuant to adjournment, and was called to order by Hon. C. C. Antoine, Lieutenant Governor of the State and President of the Senate.

On call of the roll the following Senators answered to their names: Messrs. Barber, Belden, Blackburn, Blunt, Bovee, Butler, Cagle, Chadbourn, Crawford, Daigle, Detiege, Gaudin, Greene, Harris, E. F. Herwig, Masciot, Rey, Spher, Swaizie, Thomas, Weber, Wharton, Whitney—23.

The President announced a quorum present. Prayer by the chaplain. The reading of the journal of yesterday's proceedings was dispensed with, and the journal corrected and adopted.

MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE. To the Honorable President and Members of the Senate: I have the honor to inform your honorable body that the Speaker of the House has signed an act relative to the establishment of a system of national quarantine, and ask the signature of the President of your honorable body.

To the Honorable President and Members of the Senate: I am directed by the House to ask the concurrence of your honorable body in the following House bill, viz: House bill No. 150, an act to amend and extend the limitation enacted in section five of an act entitled an act to incorporate the Star Hook and Ladder Company No. 1, of the city of Carrollton, parish of Jefferson, approved March 16, 1854.

House bill No. 187, entitled an act to amend act No. 70 of 1873, relating to pensions of veterans.

House bill No. 143, entitled a bill to provide a mode for the execution of assessments of property for taxes.

House bill No. 139, an act to incorporate the town of Many, in the parish of Sabine, to provide for the government of the same, and for other purposes.

House bill No. 165, joint resolution to memorialize Congress to establish a national observatory in the city of New Orleans.

House bill No. 333, entitled an act to change the name of William Robertson to that of Stanley H. Le Biche.

House bill No. 173, an act to change and fix the time of holding the session of the district court of the parish of Tangipahoa, in the sixth judicial district, and to fix the return day for appeals from said parish.

House bill No. 304, an act for the relief of Berry Campbell and his minor child, Estelle E. Campbell.

House bill No. 352, an act for the relief of Osborn Harris.

House bill No. 286, an act to pay C. S. Sauvaint, late civil sheriff of the parish of Orleans, for services performed and expenses incurred in suits for the collection of taxes instituted by the State of Louisiana.

House bill No. 296, an act to pay C. S. Sauvaint, late civil sheriff of the parish of Orleans, for services performed and expenses incurred in suits for the collection of taxes instituted by the State of Louisiana.

House bill No. 361, entitled an act to incorporate the Native Ladies Benevolent Association of New Orleans, Louisiana.

House bill No. 346, entitled an act to incorporate the French Curea Benevolent Association of New Orleans, Louisiana.

House bill No. 91, entitled an act to incorporate the Union Society of Honor Benevolent Association of New Orleans.

House bill No. 362, entitled an act relative to funding the floating indebtedness of the parishes of this State, and authorizing the issuance of bonds for the same, fixing the duties of parish officers, providing penalties for violation of the same, etc.

House bill No. 363, entitled an act to amend act No. 219 of 1873, relating to the collection of taxes on real estate.

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Mr. Ingram, chairman of the Committee on Enrollment and Engrossment, submitted the following: Your Committee on Enrollment and Engrossment beg leave to report as being duly engaged.

Senate bill No. 253, entitled an act to incorporate the Second Regular Baptist Association of Natchitoches, Louisiana.

Also, Senate concurrent resolution, authorizing a joint sub-committee of the Senate and House of Representatives to investigate the affairs of the Louisiana State University, located at Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

Mr. Anderson, chairman of the Committee on Judiciary, reported favorably on the following bill: Senate bill No. 263, to be entitled an act to authorize the grand jury of the parish of Madison to inquire into and investigate the murder of Thomas S. Crawford and Arthur A. Harris, and to find and return into the district court of Madison parish a bill or bills of indictment for murder against any and all persons who committed, or aided or assisted, either before or after the fact in committing said murder, the same as if the crime had been committed in Madison parish, and changing the venue in all cases growing out of said murder from the parish of Franklin to Madison parish.

Senate bill No. 369, an act creating a board of commissioners to examine and ascertain the valid and standing indebtedness of the parish of Terrebonne, and authorizing the police jury of said parish to issue bonds to take up and fund the same.

Senate bill No. 311, an act to change the name of Benjamin Cohen Carrillon to Benjamin Cohen Da Silva Abenator.

House bill No. 41, an act to amend section five of an act to incorporate the city of Monroe, to fix its boundaries, to provide for the government, and create a recorder's court for the same, approved May 4, 1871.

House bill No. 213, an act entitled an act re-issuing State warrant No. 8133, and paying the same to the police jury of the parish of Jefferson, right bank of Mississippi river, and for other purposes.

House bill No. 173, an act to change and fix the time of holding the session of the district court of the parish of Tangipahoa, in the sixth judicial district, and to fix the return day for appeals from said parish.

House bill No. 304, an act for the relief of Berry Campbell and his minor child, Estelle E. Campbell.

House bill No. 352, an act for the relief of Osborn Harris.

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House bill No. 376, entitled an act to amend act No. 219 of 1873, relating to the collection of taxes on real estate.

Mr. Weber moved to suspend the rules of the Senate to act upon the report at that time.

On motion of Mr. Weber the bill was fixed for Wednesday next at two o'clock.

Mr. Butler called for the special order of the day.

On motion of Mr. Bovee, the special order was postponed until two o'clock.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS. By Mr. Barber: A bill to be entitled an act relative to Mississippi Fire Company No. 2, of the city of New Orleans, a corporation organized under the provisions of the laws of this State; providing for the organization of certain corporations in this State, approved April 3, 1871; continuing it as a body politic under certain powers, privileges and franchises.

The bill was read the first time. The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths vote, the bill was read the second time and considered engrossed.

The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths vote, the bill was read the third time. The bill finally passed, the title to stand.

By Mr. Ingram: An act for the relief of W. E. Seebold. The bill was read the first time.

On motion of Mr. Spher the bill was referred to the Committee on Claims.

By Mr. Ingram: An act to provide for the appointment of an inspector of illuminating gas and gas meters, to regulate the inspection of the same, and to protect consumers and manufacturers of gas in the parishes of Orleans and Jefferson.

The bill was read the first time. The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths vote, the bill was read the second time and referred to the Committee on Commerce and Manufactures.

By Mr. Wharton: An act supplemental to act No. 3, approved January 29, 1874, to provide for testing, at the instance of any taxpayer, in the courts of this State the legality and validity of any items of the State indebtedness, the legality and validity of which may have been or may be heretofore questioned; to prohibit the board of liquidation under said act No. 3 of 1874 from funding the questionable and doubtful obligations of the State named or designated in this act until the same shall have been finally declared legal and valid by the Supreme Court of the State of Louisiana, and to provide the necessary means for carrying the provisions of this act into effect.

The bill was read the first time. Mr. Wharton moved to suspend the rules.

On call of the yeas and nays the Senate refused to suspend the constitutional rules by the following vote, four-fifths not voting in the affirmative: Yeas—Blunt, Bovee, Brewster, Butler, Cagle, Chadbourn, Crawford, Detiege, Greene, Gaudin, Harper, E. F. Herwig, Masciot, Rey, Stamps, Spher, Swaizie, Thomas, Whitney—21.

Nays—Anderson, Barber, Belden, Blackburn, Blunt, Brewster, Cagle, Chadbourn, Crawford, Daigle, Detiege, Gaudin, Greene, Gaudin, Harper, E. F. Herwig, Masciot, Rey, Stamps, Spher, Swaizie, Thomas, Weber, Wharton—23.

The bill lies over.

By Mr. Chadbourn: An act exempting the State of Louisiana, the police juries of the different parishes, and the municipal authorities of all incorporated towns and cities therein from paying fees in certain judicial proceedings.

The bill was read the first time. The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths vote, the bill was read the second time and referred to the Committee on Corporations and Parochial Affairs.

By Mr. Bovee: An act for the relief of Mrs. Virginia C. Burke, sole heir and testamentary executrix of her father the late John Alexander, providing for the issue of duplicates of bonds lost or stolen from said John Alexander.

The bill was read the first time. The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths vote, the bill was read the second time and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Mr. Anderson: An act entitled an act incorporating the Southern Construction Company, and authorizing it to buy, build, operate, sell, lease and mortgage railroads, canals, levees, streets and other works of public improvement and general utility; and authorizing parishes, cities and towns to make contracts with the same, and to contribute assistance thereto; providing for expropriation of property required therefor, etc.

The bill was read the first time. The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths vote, the bill was read the second time and referred to the Committee on Corporations and Parochial Affairs.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE. The President announced the following special committee on pledges and ten percent bonds, made since the first of January, 1873: R. H. Chadbourn, E. Detiege, C. F. Gaudin.

Mr. Chadbourn offered the following motion: That all local bills be made the special order at one o'clock each Friday during the remainder of the session of the Senate.

Mr. Spher offered the following amendment: That when the Senate adjourns it be till Friday, February 13, 1874, at 12 M.

The President then announced that the Senate stood adjourned until Friday, February 13, 1874, at 12 M.

Mr. Chadbourn moved to adopt the motion as amended.

ADOPTED. INTRODUCTION OF JOINT RESOLUTION. By Mr. Ingram: Relative to the appointment of a joint committee of five from each house to inquire into the causes of the decline in the production and profit of sugar culture.

The bill was read the first time. The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths vote, the bill was read the second time and referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Commerce and Manufactures.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES LYING OVER. On motion of Mr. Brewster, House bill No. 190, an act to change the name of Lucien Alexis Schwegel to that of Lucien Alexis Grandury, was taken up.

The bill was read the second time and adopted.

The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths vote, the bill was read the third time. The bill finally passed, the title to stand.

On motion of Mr. Butler, the following was taken up: House bill No. 34, an act entitled an act for the relief of Mrs. W. P. Noble, and for other purposes.

The following amendments offered by the Committee on Claims were adopted: In section two, line five, strike out "one thousand" and insert "five hundred." In same section strike out lines ten, eleven, twelve, thirteen, fourteen and fifteen.

In section three, in line twelve, strike out "one thousand" and insert "five hundred." The bill was read the second time, and, as amended, adopted on second reading.

The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths vote, the bill was read the third time. The bill finally passed, the title to stand.

[Mr. Wharton in the chair.] On motion of Whitney the following was taken up: House bill No. 6, to amend and re-enact sections two, five, six and seven of an act entitled an act to incorporate the town of Waterport, in Tensas parish, approved April 23, 1874.

The bill was read the second time and adopted on second reading.

The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths vote, the bill was read the third time. The bill finally passed, the title to stand.

On motion of Mr. Spher the following was taken up: House bill No. 151, an act to incorporate the Friends of Progress Association of the parish of St. Mary, Centerville, State of Louisiana.

The bill was read the second time and adopted on second reading.

The constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths vote, and the bill was read the third time. The bill finally passed, the title to stand.

On motion of Mr. Blunt the following was taken up: Senate bill No. 191, to amend and re-enact section 2749 of the Revised Statutes.

The bill was read the second time. Mr. Blunt moved that the bill be considered engrossed.

Mr. Harris moved to recommit the bill to the Committee on Corporations and Parochial Affairs.

Mr. Cagle moved to table the motion to recommit.

On call of the roll, the Senate voted by the following vote: Yeas—Belden, Blunt, Cagle, Greene, Wharton, Whitney—20.

Mr. Butler called for the special order of the day.

On motion of Mr. Blunt the special order was postponed for ten minutes.

On motion of Mr. Bovee the following was taken up: Senate bill No. 227, an act to amend and re-enact sections 1133 and 2046 of the Revised Statutes.

The bill was read the second time. The Chair announced the hour for the unfinished business.

Mr. Anderson moved to take up the unfinished business, being Senate bill No. 240, an act making appropriation to pay the expenses of the State auditing committee, appointed by his Excellency Governor McJannet, and confirmed by the honorable the Superior District Court of New Orleans.

The bill was taken up and read. [The President in the chair.] On motion of Messrs. Harris and Chadbourn, the Senate went into executive session.
