

ENGLAND

Section News. LONDON, February 13.—Up to this morning 325 Conservatives and 282 Liberals and Home Rulers have been elected to the new Parliament.

In Scotland the Liberals have a majority of twenty-five. The Liberal and Home Rulers are twenty-six ahead of the Conservatives in Ireland.

There was a serious election riot yesterday near the town of Stonebridge, Worcestershire. The police were unable to quell the disturbance and called upon the military, who dispersed the rioters. A number of persons were injured.

Lord George F. Hamilton and Mr. Cook (Conservative) were elected from Middlesex by an overwhelming majority. The county was last represented by a Conservative and a Liberal.

The Conservatives elected fifteen members and the Liberals eleven yesterday.

The bank directors foundered. Many lives were lost.

Rehneider, the president of the Corps Loggia under the last Emperor, has had a stroke of apoplexy.

Sickness in South America. LONDON, February 13.—The yellow fever is unabated in Rio. The cholera is raging in Buenos Ayres.

The Carlists at Bilbao. MADRID, February 13.—The investment of Bilbao by the Carlists continues. General Maricón is concentrating his troops in Santander, and will soon advance to the relief of the city.

Miscellaneous. Episcopal Convention. MILWAUKEE, February 13.—The Episcopal convention adjourned after midnight, falling to elect a bishop. An election will take place in June next, at the annual meeting. The diocese contest is between high and low ritualism.

Here Trouble with the Indians. OMAHA, February 13.—A report, just received from Fort Fetterman, states that the Indians attacked a wood party near there this morning. Twenty-five men had been sent to their relief.

General Smith, at Fort Laramie, telegraphs: I have just received information that arms and ammunition are being sent to the Sioux, Cheyennes and Arapahoes, who could be in the field on call if the whole of them are set on the war nature of the Sioux country, and forts are to be established at the Wabaton and Red Cloud agencies. This is authentic. The forts will be built, which will hold their ground and protect the agencies.

The weather for movements is favorable at present. William McWalter, who murdered a man at Nebraska City, was sentenced to a life term, to-day shot and killed Rudolph Worth and wounded two men. McWalter and John Crank, his partner, led southward. An armed body of thirty men is in pursuit of them.

The Women's War on Whisky. CINCINNATI, February 13.—The whisky war continues with furious fury. At Shelby, Ohio, 100 ladies were grossly insulted by liquor keepers. A reward of \$3,000 was offered for the capture of the whisky. The women were assaulted with a poker by one of the same fraternity.

General James H. Steedman Again to the Front. TOLEDO, Ohio, February 13.—An election held in Lucas county, yesterday, for a successor to Chief Justice Waite, in the constitutional convention, resulted in the choice of General James H. Steedman, independent Democrat, over William Barber, regular Republican.

The Navy Drill. FLORIDA BAY, February 13.—The exercises of the fleet were continued, yesterday. The fleet sailed from Key West, preparing and manipulating the rigging for battle. The weather is delightful at Key West; the monitors Sangus, Mahopac and Manhattan had large parties to-day.

The National Grange. ST. LOUIS, February 13.—In the National Grange yesterday the committee on the constitution and by-laws completed its report. The report will be read by the president of the State Grange before they are effective. They are not given for publication.

Governor Woodson Has Woke Up. Governor Woodson will issue a proclamation to-morrow offering a reward of \$3,000 apiece, dead or alive, for the men who robbed the passenger, express and mail train on the Iron Mountain railroad at Gad's Hill on January 21. In addition, it is understood the Governor of Arkansas has offered \$250 and the Postoffice Department \$500.

From Chian. SAN FRANCISCO, February 13.—The steamer Japan brings 537 passengers and 1730 tons of freight.

Crushed to Death by a Falling Building. PHILADELPHIA, February 13.—Between nine and ten o'clock this morning a terrible accident occurred at Miller's brewery, on Thirty-first and Thompson streets. The house above the brewery fell in, burying in its ruins a number of men. More than a dozen were killed; more are still in the ruins.

Intense excitement prevails in the neighborhood, and a large force of policemen are assisting in the rescue of the unfortunate workmen. Those in the ruins belonged to a new body of workmen and were unknown. This gives an added interest to the police supervision of the national exchequer. A Railroad Embarrassment. SANDUSKY, February 13.—Rush R. Sloan, removed in October from the presidency of the Cincinnati, Sandusky and Cleveland railroad, was arrested here to-day on seven distinct charges of embezzlement, preferred by the company; bail fixed at \$46,000 for his appearance next Tuesday. It is understood that further charges are to be made. Civil suits for about \$150,000 had already been commenced, Sloan's property in Chicago, Toledo, Boston and this city having been attached.

Heavy Bank Robbery at Quincy, Ill. CHICAGO, February 13.—Great excitement was created at Quincy, Illinois, this morning by the discovery that the First National Bank had been entered and the vault robbed about \$100,000 in currency belonging to the bank, besides a quantity of bonds and valuable papers and also, it is said, of quite an amount of special deposits. The bank was entered by cutting through the half floor of the second story, immediately over the vault.
