A LOOK AT THE LOWER LEVEE.

Early yesterday morning Generals Thompson and Longstreet, accompanied by a few friends, obtained the police dispatch boat to make a trip down to Noyes' canal and prominent points in that locality.

Before stopping at the canal the gentlemen visited the Depot, about a mile further down. There they found the water running over the bank in a dozen places, but not near as bad as a short time before, as laborers had succeeded in patching up some of the worst places, using odd bits of timber, earth, and almost anything at hand.

The levee is low, barely sufficient to keep the river out on a very calm day. Yesterday the wind was blowing hard, and the current and waves unusually strong.

At the Depot we were informed that the levee further down was in a still worse condition, and that a regular crevasse had occurred at the lower line of Mr. Fauchant's plantation.

The lower levee or embankment of the canal is extensive and considerably higher than the river bank, and is only 300 feet from the river, forming a barrier sufficiently strong to withstand all the pressure that can be brought to bear on it.

At this point the current sets in hard, and the levee is in a miserable condition. Had not residents in that section acted promptly last Wednesday, a crevasse would have occurred without invitation.

When the engineers returned last evening they reported to Governor Kellogg, advising that the experiment be tried forthwith, the sooner the better.

After Generals Thompson and Longstreet had made their report to Governor Kellogg last evening they expected that some action would be had, but at midnight nothing had been done, therefore the case stands the same as it did yesterday morning.
