Local Intelligence

A SPARK OF EXCITEMENT AT POLICE HEADQUARTERS.—The regular calls at police headquarters for the purpose of hearing particulars of anything transpiring in other portions of the city, but they never expect to glean a gory item at the office. Least recent proved an exception to the rule.

A few nights ago Wright Patterson, an officer stationed at the first police precinct, was having around him on his own pleasure, disturbing no one. Before ending his voyage he was met by one Thomas Williamson, who seemed ready to make war on the least provocation. Patterson fell under his displeasure and before Williamson got through with him somebody was badly bruised, and it was not Williamson. The last named escaped to the time and the scene was given to the affair until last evening, when Williamson appeared at police headquarters and the two men met. The salutation uttered by Williamson was "I can't come near killing you the other night, and I believe I'll finish you now."

This was just a dot too much for Patterson, who, although usually a mild mannered young man, is unwilling to stand still and let a villain murder him in cold blood, therefore he flung a stone, not only on the defensive, but went in on the offensive. When this thirteenth anniversary of the capture of Patterson's patience evaporated, and he fell back on such strength as is embodied in his revolver. That weapon opened fire on the assailant, and the latter, who was wounded in the chest, fell back on the ground. Patterson returned to his official duty, quite serene.

THE LODGE OF SORROW.—The Temple was crowded by an intelligent and interested audience, to witness the beautiful ceremonies performed by the Lodge of Sorrow in honor and memory of the following named distinguished members of the Supreme Council who have died since the last session of the lodge, held on the 15th inst. Charles Manning Furman, thirty-third degree, of South Carolina, and ex-convict grand commander; Charles T. Bond, thirty-third, of Mississippi; John H. Bond, thirty-third, of Louisiana; Edward Barnes, thirty-third, of Louisiana; and Richard F. Knott, thirty-third, of Alabama. The five named being at the dates of their death sovereign grand inspectors general.

The hall was festooned all around with the heavy drapery of mourning, and the rear of the hall was hung with white and black bunting, arranged in festoons, beneath which were six shields, bearing the names of the honored dead.

In the front of the hall, the members of the order in full uniform, and surrounded by burning tapers, a handsome coffin was arranged, over which were the arms of the lodge, and the following inscription: "The spot was further ornamented with growing flowers in urns and baskets, giving a sacred beauty to the scene."

General Albert Pike occupied the chair of exalted grand commander, and Messrs. McCracken, of Oregon, and Coswell, of California, the chairs of senior and junior grand wardens.

The ceremonies were from the ritual of the order, and were performed with great impressiveness and solemnity.

An ordinance levying city taxes for the year 1874, in conformity with act No. 33 of the acts of the General Assembly of Louisiana, approved March 12, 1874, to modify and reduce the last tax levy for the same, viz:

Whereas, The City Council is required under the act above referred to "to correct, modify and reduce the last budget and tax levy in accordance with the provisions of all other acts of reduction of tax levies which may be adopted during the present session relative to said city."

Be it ordained, That, in conformity with the several acts of the General Assembly relative thereto, and with ordinance No. 2590, Administration Series, adopted May 5, 1874, the following taxes be and are hereby levied and assessed for the year 1874 on all the taxable property within the city of New Orleans, according to the assessment for said year:

City debt tax (for the payment of interest on the city debt), one dollar on each one hundred dollars of valuation.

Current city expenses (for the payment of expenditures other than those for interest on city debt, public schools, Metropolitan Police, and other city expenses), six-tenths of one cent on each one hundred dollars of valuation.
