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CITY COUNCIL—OFFICIAL

REGULAR MEETING. CITY HALL, NEW ORLEANS, Tuesday, May 19, 1874.

The Council met this day at 12 M., in regular session.

Present—Hon. Louis A. Wiltz, Mayor, presiding, and Administrators Brewster, Calhoun, Fitzreiter, Lewis, Schneider, Sturcken and Turnbull.

The minutes of the last meeting were approved.

Communications from the Mayor and Administrators.

The following message from the Mayor was read and referred to the committee of the whole:

TO THE CITY COUNCIL OF NEW ORLEANS: I have the honor to inform the Council that on the instant, Charles A. Wiltz, Esq., agent of the Morgan Estate, in presence of a notary public and Henry J. Leovy, Esq., attorney for Mr. Morgan, formally tendered to me the sum of \$54,000 in payment for the same, as being in the first section of an ordinance, No. 1492, New Series, adopted July 15, 1869, in which the privilege of purchase of said lot by Charles Morgan is granted. I declined receiving the money tendered, with the view of first consulting the Council and receiving its instructions. I present herewith for the information of the Council a copy of the first section of ordinance No. 1492, New Series, referred to. I recommend that the subject be referred to the committee of the whole.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of New Orleans, That the City of New Orleans will sell, and hereby agrees to sell and to convey and deliver to Charles Morgan, his heirs and assigns, all that portion of ground lying and being in the First District of the City of New Orleans, between Water street and the Mississippi river, and bounded above by a line being the prolongation of the lower line of Notre Dame street, and below by a line, being a prolongation of the upper line of Girod street, as the same is named and defined in the ordinance, No. 1492, New Series, referred to, and extend from the said Water street to the Mississippi river, together with all the riparian rights and privileges in anywise belonging to or appertaining to the same, and in consideration of the price and sum of \$54,000, to be paid to the City by the said Charles Morgan at the time of the execution of the deed to be prepared to carry out this ordinance, and it being well understood in making the said sale, that if at any time becomes expedient or necessary, in the opinion of the City Council, to widen or extend the said Water street, or to lay out or extend other streets through the said portion of ground parallel with Water street aforesaid, that then, and in that case, the said Charles Morgan shall not be entitled to claim or receive any compensation for the land which may be taken for such street or streets; provided, that any such street or streets shall not exceed sixty feet in width, and that no square which shall be formed between the said Notre Dame and Girod streets shall have a front less than three hundred feet, and that the said Notre Dame and Girod streets, respectively.

A communication was received from Mr. Lewis, suggesting that a water cart be employed to sprinkle Canal street from the Claiborne canal to the cemetery, and another water cart to sprinkle Washington street, from Magazine street to Carrollton avenue. Received.

The Mayor laid before the Council the report of William A. Bell, Henry Shepherd, Booth and Charles Fitz, citizens appointed a committee, which was requested by Mr. Schneider, to investigate the charges against him as Administrator of Finance. The report was read and received, and the committee discharged from the further consideration of the subject.

Financial Business and Other Bills on Final Passage.

Mr. Calhoun called up the ordinances described as follows, which, having been read twice, were now on third reading, and passed unanimously, the yeas and nays having been called on each, and all the members present at roll call voting:

“Providing for the payment of the several accounts therein named,” beginning Johnson Armstrong & Co., with an amendment, striking out the item of J. H. Wilberding.

“Providing for the payment of the several accounts therein named,” beginning Strickett & Weimann, with an amendment, striking out the words “roof,” in the item of John L. Leefe.

“Providing for a settlement with Behan, Thorne & Co., transferees of a registered bill.”

“Providing for the payment of the several accounts therein named,” beginning Madison Johnson.

Reports of Committees.

Mr. Fitzreiter, upon the petition of the Firemen's Charitable Association, for the transfer of the Parish Prison bell to the Magazine Market, recommended the purchase of a bell and the erection of a belfry at said market. Received.

Mr. Sturcken reported unfavorably upon the petitions of Randall Hunt, Mrs. Marie Bourdette and Mrs. Maria J. C. Swazey, for reduction of their respective assessments. Received.

The Mayor, for the committee of the whole, reported that the claim of C. S. Hunt & Co. had been partly investigated, and asked for time for further consideration of the subject. Granted.

The Mayor, for the same committee, reported:

1. On the petition of Thomas O'Connor, chief engineer, for repairs to the engine house of Perseverance Fire Company No. 13, unfavorably. Received.

2. On the petition of Joseph Goetz, foreman of Phoenix Fire Company No. 8, for the repairs of the stable of said company, unfavorably. Received.

3. On the petition of Columbia Steam Fire Company No. 5, for a new engine house, unfavorably. Received.

4. On the petition of Protector Fire Company No. 4, Sixth District, for an appropriation to assist in paying for a new engine house, unfavorably. Received.

5. On the petition of the Firemen's Charitable Association of Algiers, for additional appropriation, unfavorably. Received.

6. On the petition of Morgan Fire Company No. 3, Fifth District, for an engine house, unfavorably. Received.

Mr. Lewis reported unfavorably on the claim of Joseph Beaulieu, for damages from overflow. Received.

Mr. Turnbull reported unfavorably, by resolution, on the petition of Albert Rolle, to be allowed a blacksmith shop at the corner of Frenchmen and Josephine streets. Mr. Lewis reported that the lowest bid received for towing the nuisance boats for one year was from R. E. Edgeworth, and recommended that the contract be adjudicated to him. Received.

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Ordinances and Resolutions Offered.

By Mr. Turnbull, and adopted: 1. Allowing Albert Rolle to erect a blacksmith shop at the corner of Frenchmen and Josephine streets.

2. Providing penalties for cutting the protection levees surrounding the city.

3. Permitting T. J. Thompson to erect a rice mill at No. 64 Decatur street.

By Mr. Lewis, and adopted: 1. To contract with Higgins & Wilson for graveling Rampart street, between Dumaine and Hospital streets.

2. Authorizing advertisement for proposals for furnishing and erecting new boilers and fire front in the Dublin avenue draining improvement for the purpose of furnishing lumber and timber for use on the wharves and streets.

By Mr. Sturcken, and adopted: For the relief of the estate of M. C. Stevens, Mrs. J. B. Eustis, George Spruel and the Union Baptist School and Church.

By Mr. Calhoun, and read twice: An ordinance providing for the payment of the several accounts therein named.

Be it ordained, That the following appropriations be and are hereby made, and that the Administrator of Public Accounts warrant on the Administrator of Finance in payment of the same, whenever there shall be money in the city treasury to the credit of the appropriate fund for each account, and not otherwise appropriated:
