Céspedes and Cuba. The New York Herald of the eighth instant publishes the following Cuban news:

Colonel Carlos M. Céspedes, the eldest son of the late President of Free Cuba, arrived in New Orleans, Friday evening last from Kingston, Jamaica. Colonel Céspedes left the shores of his native Cuba on the sixth of last month, and after being placed aboard by the patriot and his companions, succeeded in landing near Falmouth, Jamaica, being unable to reach St. Ann's bay, the usual place of landing from Cuba blockade runners. Colonel Céspedes was accompanied in his perilous voyage by the lieutenant Don Joaquin Castellanos, a patriot who belongs to the town of Bayamo, two children and six seamen. While at sea the Spanish gunboats made the hazardous run without any mishap. As the frail craft was supplied with fuel and provisions the adventurous patriot and his companions escaped the pangs of hunger which many others going the same way have felt keenly enough.

Colonel Céspedes reported that he left the camp of Major Castellanos, the object of the expedition on the sixth of May at Jiguani, on the Cauto river. On the third of that month an action had been fought between two Cuban and Spanish forces, the latter numbered about 250 Spaniards and the action was commenced by a Spanish guerrilla force of twenty-five men, who were speedily captured and dispersed by the Cubans. The Spaniards sent reinforcements from Jiguani to the scene of the action, but these arriving too late to succor the guerrilla band gave battle to the patriots. The battle lasted about two P. M. until night, when both parties withdrew without any decided advantage on either side.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 41.] An act to facilitate the exportation of distilled spirits, and amendatory of the acts heretofore on that subject.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That whenever the owner or owners of distilled spirits shall desire to withdraw the same from any distillery, bonded warehouse, or for exportation under existing law, such owner or owners may at their option, in lieu of executing an export bond as now provided by law, give a transportation receipt, to be countersigned by the collector of internal revenue, and under such rules and regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe, conditioned for the due delivery of the spirits to the collector of internal revenue to be named therein, and in such case, on arrival of the spirits at the port of export, the exporter or owner at that port shall immediately notify the collector of internal revenue at that port, setting forth his intention to report the same, and the name of the vessel upon which the same are to be laden, and the port to which they are to be shipped.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 41.] An act to facilitate the exportation of distilled spirits, and amendatory of the acts heretofore on that subject.
