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CITY COUNCIL—OFFICIAL

REGULAR MEETING.

The Council met this day at 12 M., in regular session. Present.—Hon. Louis A. Wiltz, Mayor, presiding, and Administrators Brewster, Calhoun, Fitzreiter, Lewis and Schneider.

Financial Business and Other Bills on the Passage

Mr. Calhoun called up the ordinance described as follows, which, having been read twice, were now on third reading, and they passed unanimously, the yeas and nays having been called on each and all the members present at roll call voting:

Reports of Commissioners. The Mayor, for Mr. Sturcken, submitted a report adverse to the petition of Frank Vatter, W. B. Bowman, Edward Thompson, W. N. Siebrock, E. Conery & Sons, Widow B. Carcelin, A. de Monasterio and John Andrews.

Upon the recommendation of Mr. Lewis the petition for a lamp post and a street bridge at the intersection of Spain and St. Charles streets was taken from him and referred to the Administrator of Public Accounts.

The Mayor, for the standing committee created by ordinance No. 932, Administration of the City of New Orleans, reported in favor of the petition of Henry Denis, Georgina Cook and Mrs. E. Degruy, and the report was adopted.

Ordinances and Resolutions Offered. By the Mayor, for Mr. Sturcken, and adopted: For the relief of Edward Burke, Mrs. A. Ledoux, T. R. Finlay, Henry M. Mayer, P. Moreau and William A. Busch.

By the Mayor, for the committee of the whole, and adopted: Authorizing advertisement, by the Mayor, for proposals to sell to the city a site for the fourth McDonough schoolhouse, in the Fifth District.

By the Mayor, for the committee of the whole, and read once: An ordinance to repeal an ordinance of the City Council of New Orleans, passed on the 15th day of August, 1861, creating an ordinance providing for the proper management and administration of the fund derived from the sale of the property belonging to the succession of the late John P. D. Fink, and all other ordinances, resolutions and regulations on the same subject, and also providing for the appointment of commissioners to report on an asylum to be called the Fink Asylum, to be used solely as an asylum for Protestant widows and orphans in this city.

By the Mayor, for the committee of the whole, and read twice: An ordinance providing for the payment of the several accounts therein named, beginning Peter Markey.

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Petitions

From the Board of Health, recommending the washing of streets and gutters. To the Administrator of Improvements and the Administrator of Waterworks and Public Buildings.

From proprietors and residents in the Sixth District, for bridges at certain street crossings, and from John L. Hess, for payment for property of his expropriated by the city authorities in 1853. To the Administrator of Improvements.

From Pierre Mercer, through his attorney, A. Arroz, to be paid for a cow killed when unlawfully impounded, and from Adolph Schreiber, for a lamp on Miro street. To the Administrator of Police.

From J. Decon, for permission to move his steam tobacco factory to the corner of Bienville and Levee streets; from Adam Weber and J. Buisson, for permission to open a gap in the levee in the Sixth District, and from J. W. Fairfax, A. S. Badger and William Johnson, a committee of Mechanics' Fire Company No. 6, asking an appropriation to enable the company to build a stable. To the Administrator of Commerce.

From Hays & New, as attorneys for Freeman Clark, proposing amicable adjustment of a suit he has pending against the late city of Carrollton; from A. D. Doricoourt, to be permitted to withdraw earnest money deposited by him as a purchaser of the Lacroix property, sold for taxes; from F. Deibel, treasurer of the late city of Carrollton, to be reimbursed for losses incurred by him through a law suit provoked by his defense of what he regarded as the public interest, and from J. B. Walton, respecting a demand from J. M. Bilgery for earnest money deposited with petitioner, as auctioneer for the sale of the Lacroix property for taxes. To the Administrator of Public Accounts.

From the Home Mutual Insurance Company, Charles D. Alter, Leonard Pash, D. Rogers, agent of Mrs. Morgan and of the estate of M. & G. Morgan, and from W. W. Dillard, agent for Mrs. Earles and for W. Millard, praying for a reduction of their respective assessments. To the Administrator of Assessments.
