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ECHOES.

The Northern Press on the Southern Outrages.

We again call the attention of our readers to the expressions of the leading newspapers of the North on the Southern situation.

The following is from the New York Daily Tribune, of September 3:

There never was a more pro-resolutely determined and more energetic effort made by the Southern States, first, to bring slavery to the base of the South--and that institution was its greatest glory--second, in order to perpetuate it, and third, to bring it to a point of conflict with the Federal Government as soon as by an adverse election it had passed out of their hands.

Third, though greatly lacking in capital, enterprise and talent, they have, in the past, been distinguished by their energy, their courage, their patriotism, and their devotion to the cause of their country.

By this act, this so-called Conservative, and really a Democratic, party, has done a deed which will be remembered for generations to come.

The coming elections, including the next presidential election, will undoubtedly be a great triumph for the Southern States in the interest of justice, humanity, and the constitution.

More than that, if it can be constitutionally done, the Gulf States will be re-annexed to the Union, a condition from which they should not have been elevated after the war till they had time to become civilized.

WASHINGTON.

Army Headquarters at St. Louis. Washington, September 7.--The official order continuing the banishment of the General of the armies from the seat of government to St. Louis is as follows:

Washington, September 7, 1874. General Orders No. 121.

Pursuant to provisions of general order No. 103, War Department, Adjutant General's office, September 7, 1874, the headquarters of the army will be established at St. Louis, Missouri, on the fifteenth day of October, 1874, and all communications and reports to these headquarters hereafter required will be addressed accordingly.

The following officers will be transferred from Washington to St. Louis: Colonel W. D. Whipple, adjutant-general; Colonel J. M. Bacon, adjutant-general; Colonel J. M. Bacon, adjutant-general; Colonel J. M. Bacon, adjutant-general.

United States engineers will remain in Washington, and all maps, reports of reconnaissance and of explorations will be sent them to be compiled and transmitted to the army headquarters.

Colonel W. D. Whipple will, about the first of October, cause the records, library and furniture of the present office to be carefully packed and marked, and turned over to the quartermaster's department for transportation to the new headquarters.

The clerks and orderlies, seven in number, now employed at the headquarters of the army, will at the same time be transferred to St. Louis.

Southern Republican Convention.

A convention, urged by the more moderate Southern Republicans, and sanctioned by Senator Chandler, chairman of the congressional committee, has been called by the national committee, to meet at Atlanta, Georgia, on the 15th inst.

Becher's Answer.

The answer of Henry Ward Becher to the complaint of Christian K. Ross is returned today by Mr. Becher's attorneys, and was at once served on the plaintiff.

First--That each and every allegation in the said complaint contained, except that plaintiff and Miss Elizabeth R. Richards were married October 2, 1855, and lived together as husband and wife up to 1874, is untrue.

Second--That the defendant never had any relations with the wife of the plaintiff, and never attempted or sought to have any such relations.

Appended to this answer is the oath of Henry Ward Becher, sworn to before a notary public on the 7th inst.
