The International War Congress.

The following is from the Brussels correspondent of the New York World:

The International Congress for the "amelioration of warfare" has taken extraordinary care to prevent proceedings from being made public, but some facts concerning them have been communicated to me.

They are trustworthy as far as they go. At the opening of the congress, Baron Jomini, distinguished delegate, read the paper of instructions which he had received from his government. These instructions directed him to urge upon the congress the importance of inducing all the governments to adhere to a precise understanding as to what was to be allowed and what was to be prohibited in warfare.

If this were done the consequences of war could be calculated before-hand, and the calamities occasioned by ignorance or uncertainty would be greatly mitigated.

War, in fact, should be reduced to a game with certain well defined and limited rules, and in which, when the rules are broken, the offender should be punished.

"Everything is fair in war" should be abolished. If a flag of truce is pulled, a trump out of his boot or shows against his opponent's two aces and three kings three aces and two kings he is ruled out of the game.

It is a matter of surprise that certain individuals of this goodly city should now be so anxious to get hold of a gun; they leap with frantic eagerness at the sight of a pistol and howl with horror at the power that withholds them from becoming walking arsenals.

Superior District Courts.

City of New Orleans vs. Francois Lacroix—Intervention of Louis Fix, alleging that a piece of defendant's property, situated in square No. 51, was seized and sold for taxes under two writs of fieri facias by the sheriff, and adjudicated to him for \$125; that he paid cash to the sheriff \$114 75; that since that sale the same property has been seized for State taxes, and in spite of mover's opposition, sold and adjudicated to J. J. O'Hara. Rule granted on city to show cause, August 15, why the money paid the sheriff should not be returned.

Regatta Notes.

As the day approaches when the various clubs of the State Rowing Association will contest for victory, public interest in the affair becomes more and more intense.

The crews of each club are in fine condition and good feather. There will be but three contestants in the shell race, the Pelicans, the Orleans and Riverside clubs. The gig race will be contested by five boats, the Howards, the Pelicans, the Orleans, the Riverside and the Louisiana.

Every arrangement has been made by the gentlemen of the State Rowing Association and the clubs of which it is composed for the comfort and convenience of spectators. The steamer R. E. Lee, Katie and La Belle will convey passengers to and from Carrollton.

The Association has chartered the tug-boat Charlie Woods for the use of the judges and members of the press.

This evening and to-morrow evening pools will be sold at the Regatta Saloon on St. Charles street, sales to commence at half-past seven o'clock each evening. The betting as yet has not developed to a very great extent. In the shell race, the Riverside have the call, being taken at even against the fleet. The gig race is popularly supposed to be between the Howards and Pelicans. The programme agreed upon is for the regatta to begin at four o'clock, when the shell race will be called; at five o'clock the gig race will be called, and the other races to follow as quickly as practicable.

The Election.

Governor Kellogg has issued his proclamation of election, and it will be found in the REPUBLICAN. The people of the State are called upon to elect eighteen members of the Senate and an entire House of Representatives. They will elect six congressmen, and local parish officers. No mention is made of city officers of New Orleans. Several important amendments of the State constitution are presented to be voted upon. These are explained fully in the proclamation. The election will take place on Monday, November 2, or seven weeks from next Monday.

White League Precepts.

The Baton Rouge Advocate has a very small paper, but it has room enough to publish the two following extracts in the same issue. The first is section eight of the platform of the "white people's" convention, which met in that town on the twenty-fourth of August:

"We extend to all of our race in every clime the right hand of fellowship and a cordial invitation to come and settle among us, and unite their destinies with ours."

The other is a resolution adopted by the Baton Rouge White League No. 1 on the fifth of September. They read well together, and convey their own moral:

"That all the members of his organization compose a committee, with the secretary as its chairman, and that it be the duty of every member of said committee to report to the chairman the names of all white men who, through indifference to the future welfare of the white race of Louisiana, have failed to register; and that a list of those names be kept for publication after the election together with the names of all white men who voted the Radical ticket."
