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The Merchants' Exchange.

The building at the corner of Poydras and Teche streets was formally dedicated yesterday noon as a Merchants' Exchange, and taken possession of by an association of merchants representing the Western produce, grain and tobacco trade in this city.

Following the chairman, Mr. R. S. Howard gave a concise statement of the condition and prospects of trade in New Orleans. He spoke by the card, as one who remembered when the river commerce of this city drifted hither on flatboats, since which it had steadily increased in proportions.

General Cyrus Bussey also made a few remarks most appropriate and encouraging regarding our trade with the West, and its possible extension to Mexico and other portions of the commercial world near at hand.

The Exchange is provided with sample tables for the convenience of those selling or buying by sample, and many of these tables were yesterday disposed of at auction, Mr. C. E. Nash acting as auctioneer.

The Exchange has been put in direct communication by telegraph with similar exchanges in New York, St. Louis, Cincinnati, Chicago and Louisville, and at regular hours each day the state of the market in each of those cities will be posted for the benefit of subscribers.

Samuel Muller, Esq., is permanent superintendent of the Exchange, and will make an efficient officer--one thoroughly competent and courteous. Starting under such encouraging circumstances, the new Exchange bids fair to accomplish for its subscribers all things hoped for.

Marriage of General Sherman's Daughter.

WASHINGTON, October 1.--The marriage of Miss Maria Ewing Sherman, daughter of General and Mrs. W. T. Sherman, to Mr. Thomas W. Fitch, of the Engineer Corps, United States navy, was celebrated at the St. Aloysius Roman Catholic Church at eleven o'clock today.

The marriage ceremony was performed by the most Rev. Archbishop Farrell, of Cincinnati, after which a nuptial mass was celebrated by that distinguished prelate. The crowd at the church was immense, and many were unable to gain admission.

An Incident of the Wedding. This morning as the President and Mrs. Grant were on their way in a carriage to St. Aloysius Church, to witness the marriage of their daughter, General Sherman, along K street, near Eighth, one of the horses managed to get his leg over the trace, and becoming frightened, both animals and driver were thrown.
