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The Trouble in Jackson.

Senator Weber, of Bayou Sara, furnishes the following statement of the recent difficulty in East Feliciana parish:

That I may not be misinterpreted, and that a truthful statement of the Jackson affair may be laid before the public, I send you the following statement, which will be substantiated by responsible citizens of Jackson.

A meeting of the friends of Hon. James Law, Hon. John E. Breaux and myself was called at Jackson for Saturday, the seventh instant. Several Conservatives were advertised to speak with us at the same place, and the object of the meeting was principally to nominate a parish ticket which would be acceptable to all classes of citizens, irrespective of race or color.

While speeches were being made members of the band were approached by P. C. Butler and A. Bannan, both friends and supporters of John Fair, and told that they were to play any more that they (Butler and Bannan) would fire into and disperse them.

Whereas, I am credibly informed that Mr. E. John Ellis, Democratic candidate for Congress in the Second District, did, in a speech delivered by him at a mass meeting held in the town of Gretna, on the nineteenth of October, instant, assert that the Jefferson parish school board was a defaulter to a large amount, giving my name as authority, permit me to say through your paper that such an assertion, if made, was entirely unwarranted, as no school board has ever been named in the parish of Jefferson in now nor ever has been a defaulter since the establishment of the present school system.

As we understand it, Lieutenant Cooke was expected to report on the cause of the unlawful arming and riotous conduct of the White Leaguers of St. Martin. As an impartial observer of the peace it is his duty to know which men caused the trouble. He is not a court to sit in judgment upon, but he will be found a competent witness, and hence the protest.

Lieutenant Cooke has no right or authority to enter into any investigation or inquiry, into the mode and manner that registration or elections are conducted in this State and parish, and he can not, therefore, interfere with the United States marshals, operating in Lincoln and other parishes, but their intentions have not been ascertained.

Byring up the Carlists. New York, October 23.—A reliable special says the Madrid government sent \$500,000 for distribution among the Carlist chiefs in Spain.

Hamilton, the Defaulter. Alexander D. Hamilton, the defaulting treasurer of Jersey City, has returned, and given himself up to the authorities. He absconded last February with \$50,000, which has been in Matamoros, Mexico, California, and fired, at last, of an ontcast and roving life. He was floored out of \$20,000, by a guide, between Corpus Christi and Brownsville.

Convicted. Rev. John Cowan, formerly chaplain of the Sixth New York Artillery, and John Kehoe, were today tried in the United States Circuit Court for attempting to defraud the government of one hundred dollars. They were fined the sum of \$100 each, and sentenced to the penitentiary for six months.

Married Jockey Club Races. BALTIMORE, October 23.—Yesterday was the third day of the annual fall meeting of the Maryland Jockey Club. The weather was favorable and the track all that could be desired.
