The Rights of Counsel.

It seems to be established that Republics are to be denied the right of defense by counsel. At any rate, lawyers who take charge of cases for Republican prisoners are to be identified with the offenses.

The following communication of Mr. White illustrates the difference in this respect between the Democratic press of Franklin and the Republican journals everywhere. In a lawyers' war like the present, one would suppose any infringement of the rights of the knights of the green haz would be promptly frowned down.

EDITOR REPUBLICAN: Permit me to take the columns of your paper to a most violent attack against me in the Enterprise of this place.

The laws of our State guarantee to every prisoner such counsel as he may desire, and it is the duty of every lawyer to see that the law is heard by an attorney. Now, suppose a brilliant and talented lawyer had been assigned by the court to the defense of these prisoners.

I deny any one to show that I did any wrong in the conduct of that case which could not legitimately be done by an attorney for the defense. When the prisoners objected to a juror I challenged him. No attorney can defend a man without the right to be tried by those of known hostility to him, if it can be prevented.

The article in question says that I stated that the four prisoners "had been hauled down by a band of white men." This is not true. I did not say so.

Was it a Fair Election?

The Bulletin of yesterday afternoon contains a statement in relation to the parish of Sabine which, if true, is a subject for the consideration of the Returning Board. This is what it says:

The official vote of this parish, which has just been received, is as follows: Monroe 511, Dubouché 4. This is the Democratic majority, according to our estimate, to 504 votes.

We can not concede, even for the sake of argument, that the information received by the Bulletin is "official," as no official returns have come in from Sabine, nor does the result so given indicate the sentiment of the parish if it were allowed a fair expression.

The population of the parish is 1502 white and 1847 colored—a little more than two to one. Have all these colored voters become Democrats except two, and are there no white Republicans, politely called carpet-baggers, in that parish? If so, singularly blissful from a White League standpoint, must the condition of things be. Why, the Republican ticket must have had, at least, ten names on it, and some of them must have been those of white men.

But applying another test, the authenticity of which the Bulletin will be the last to dispute, the vote of the parish in 1873, as given in the Forman returns, is valuable. According to the ratio of population the colored vote, no pretensions of Democratic affiliations being set up then, should have been nearly half that of the fusion. But, on the contrary, the Democratic vote is given as the largest by more than twelve to one.

No, there is but one of two solutions of the mystery of the discrepancy between this "official vote" and the population, or even between it and the Forman returns. The colored people have not become Democratic to such an extent nor have they left the parish. They are Republicans, are as strong in numbers and as desirous of voting. Either they have been intimidated or prevented in some way from registering and voting, or gross fraud has been committed with the ballots.

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The South and the Elections.

It is perhaps too soon to make even an approximate estimate of the result of the recent elections in the South. It is sufficient information to warrant the assertion that with the exceptions in a few scattered congressional districts, in Alabama, for example, the Republican party section have proved themselves to be more active, to be truer to principle and more earnest in their opposition to the Democratic party, than in any previous election.

They have done this under most adverse circumstances, and under discouraging influences. While the Northern people were absorbed with thoughts of their own local interests and feelings, which in many regards are in no way connected with the cardinal principles upon which the party rests, the Republicans of the South have been engaged in a bitter battle face to face with the implacable enemy, whose hordes of infamous assassins and bloody persecutors have not hesitated to resort to means to obtain success which would make the countenance of the most savage with blushes of shame.

WASHINGTON.

Appropriations—Laying out Work for the Next Session of Congress. WASHINGTON, November 10.—It was expected that the House Committee on Appropriations would hold a meeting to consider the work of preparing the regular appropriation bills in advance of the assembling of Congress, but no quorum was present.

The Senate Committee on Appropriations will assemble here on the fifteenth instant with the view to laying out their work and making detailed examinations of the various features of the civil service, so as to be prepared to report upon the annual appropriation bills as fast as they are received from the House.

Official Vote of Kansas. ATCHISON, Kansas, November 10.—The official returns from fifty-four counties and accurate returns from the remaining sixteen counties show the Republican (Republican) majority for Governor to be 14,322. In the first congressional district the official returns from twenty-four counties and accurate returns from the remaining ten counties show the Republican (Republican) majority for Congress to be 8,541.

St. Paul, November 10.—Very nearly complete returns in the election in this State show the Republican State ticket elected by over 500 majority. Dannel, Republican, for Congress in the first district is elected by 3,011 majority. W. S. King, Democrat, for Congress in the third district, has 2,311 majority, with a few precincts to hear from.

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MISCELLANEOUS.

Those Good People of Lincoln. WYOMING, Lincoln Parish, La., November 10.—The utmost good feeling prevails toward the consolidation of the empire, and the officers and soldiers of the army are well disposed persons. From the moment Lieutenant Hodgson was arrested at Monroe and taken to the assistance of the soldiers, he has been treated with respect and honor. There is no ground for complaint; on the contrary, the citizens can be said to assist the soldiers in their own hands.

Kentucky Episcopalians. LOUISVILLE, November 10.—The Episcopal convention for the diocese of Kentucky meets here to-morrow to elect an assistant bishop, in place of the late Dr. H. H. Hays. A Courier-Journal special says three men were arrested in Shelby county, Kentucky, to-day, charged with the shooting of the negro girl in that county last month. Two more arrests are expected to-morrow. The county authorities have been diligently at work ever since the outrage was committed, gathering evidence in the case. The wounded girl has nearly recovered.

Wisconsin Congressmen. MILWAUKEE, November 10.—Returns from remote counties indicate that Cole, Democrat, beats McDill, Republican, several hundred.

Trampled to Death as a Churn. MONTREAL, November 10.—A curious accident occurred in the city of Montreal to-day. An alarm of fire. Three hundred persons were trampled upon, some fatally.

Arkansas Legislature in Session. LITTLE ROCK, November 10.—The Governor's Assembly, convened for the new session of the Arkansas Legislature, opened to-day at the State Capitol. The Senate organized, electing Hon. Bradley Branch, of Carroll, president. The House elected Hon. A. C. Cunningham, of Hot Springs, Speaker, and adjourned until to-morrow.

Richmond, November 10.—The conference between the Governor and Treasury of the State and the holders of Virginia bonds met at noon in the State Senate Chamber. Previous to the meeting being called to order, the representatives of the city press endeavored to gain admission, but were refused, except W. D. Chesterman, of the Dispatch, who had credentials from the State.

Relief for France. A special dispatch to the Standard reports that 10,000 Republican troops have collected in the approaches to Lun for the relief of the town, but the Carlists occupy the intervening passes in great force.

English Crop Prospects. The Mark Lane Express says the weather this week has been mild, and oats which at one time seemed hopeless, now show quite a crop. Moisture was wanted in abundance, but there is now some apprehension as to the result of the season, which will be checked by frost. Wheat sowing is nearly over.

A Speech by Disraeli. The facilities of the Lord Mayor's day concluded with a grand banquet at Guild Hall. Among the distinguished persons present were Disraeli, Lord Cairns, Earl Derby, Marquis of Salisbury, Sir Stafford Northcote, Messrs. Harcourt and Cross, Earl Malmesbury, Lord John Manners and Mr. Goschen. The Lord Mayor gave the usual toast to her majesty and ministers.
