The Pinchback Case in the Senate.

The Washington correspondent of the Chicago Inter Ocean gives the following account of the closing debate on the resolution to accord Senator Pinchback his seat in the Senate: The closing debate on the Pinchback case was productive of a pure Democratic triumph. Senator Edmunds, who it is said, is a long contemplated position on this party on this question, but only made his mind at almost the last moment. His argument was that to admit Pinchback on his prima facie case would be an absurdity; the entire case had been investigated, and the facts laid before the Senate. He claimed that these facts showed that there was nothing upon which to rest the prima facie case.

Fitz John Porter.
