Local Intelligence.

The evidence was such as to warrant the judge in sending accused to the Superior Criminal Court as an accessory.

CITY TAXES AND LICENSES.—Taxes received for the third instalment, \$615,322; fifth, \$577,45; sixth, \$222,97; total \$1,215,744. Licenses for same dates, \$724.

ALARM BELL FOR VIGILANT No. 3.—Superintendent Weeks has at last been enabled to place a bell in the tower of the enginehouse of Vigilant Fire Company No. 3, and with strings, machinery, etc., the alarm is being thoroughly repaired. That action of our city, out Esplanade street, has long needed this advantage, and Mr Weeks now feels better for the improvement.

HE SOLD TOO MANY TICKETS.—Louis Mottes would sell unlicensed lottery tickets, although Detective Dunas warned him not to do so. Mottes, however, went on, but Dunas put a pigeon on his track and took him in the act. Judge Stues fined accused \$25, and which has not been paid, before the judge's hands in the Parish Prison. During the week he will be arraigned by Judge Evans and probably take another dose of prison. Mottes thinks that New Orleans officers are altogether too particular.

IN THE FIRST MUNICIPAL POLICE COURT.—Judge Evans walked away with good business yesterday and did not feel very weary either.

Molly McCarthy threatened to utterly annihilate Molly McCormack at any cost, but she finally concluded it best to pay a fine of \$10 and go home. Her sister, Mrs. Henry Reid, did not like the conduct of his sister, so he battered her to his satisfaction. The judge intimated that he might go down and see a jury about it.

John Johnson, in order to demonstrate the complete disgust he entertained for Auguste Manuel, tried to knock the socks off of that individual, for which he was fined \$10 and sent to the Parish Prison.

William Smith, burglar and larceny, on the suggestion of J. D. Martin, No. 215 Annunciation street, goes to the Superior Criminal Court.

William Jamison knocked fits out of James Lewis, and will be tried by a dozen of his peers.

Eley and Louis Williams not only assaulted but battered Mary Roper for which she travels down to the Criminal Court.

William McCoy carried a concealed weapon, and will try to tell Judge Abel what he will do with it.

Thomas Calk, a blind beggar, did not like the kind of talk Elizabeth Ryan gave him, so he gave her a pair of black eyes. He struck out blindly with his cane, and "his woman's face" being in the way, his eyes were blown. Calky will be a jury to let him off.

Willis Harley received stolen property knowingly for which he is being arraigned during this week.

This was a pretty good day's work of itself, but is not one-fourth of the business attended to by Judge Evans.

TWO MORE MYSTERIOUS DISAPPEARANCES.—Monday evening Miss Mary Tinsley disappeared from the residence of her aunt, Mrs. Michel, No. 81 Baronne street, and up to dark last evening nothing had been heard from her. She is not sixteen years old, and was a pupil in the Magnolia School. The only reason which is given for her absence is that on the day she disappeared one of her girlish whims was opposed. She is of slender form, and was dressed in ordinary calico with a white apron.

A Ferrido stress cotton factor, on the shady side of life, disappeared last evening, but it is not likely that anything serious has happened to him. Many persons in the city claim to have recognized the gang of cotton-canners made their appearance in the Globe Theatre.

CHASING THE BURGLARS.—Detectives Pearson and Deveraux have been diligently looking after the burglars who recently entered the store of Mr. Sprague, under the name of Charles Hotel, and have met with some success. The rascals left an old coat and a pair of shoemaker's pliers in the store, and that was the only thing they carried off with them. They finally learned who owned the coat, and visited a house where owner had been seen occasionally, at the corner of Franklin and Poydras streets, where they found remnants of their operation, which were identified by the owner. A pair of cloth, lately stolen from a Second District merchant, was also identified. The owner did not profit much by their operation, but obtained sufficient to carry them to Louisiana.

CITY COUNCIL—OFFICIAL

REGULAR MEETING.

CITY HALL, NEW ORLEANS, Tuesday, April 6, 1875.

The Council met this day at 12 M., in regular session.

Present.—Hon. Charles J. Leedes, Mayor, presiding, and Administrators Bertoli, Bouy, Brown, Landry, McCarthy and Pillsbury.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved and their reading dispensed with.

Communications from the Mayor and Administrators.

The Mayor presented the following veto message, which was read:

MAJORITY OF NEW ORLEANS, City Hall, April 6, 1875.

To the City Council of New Orleans:

I return, without my approval, resolution to grant permission to erect a bulletin board at the corner of Common and St. Charles streets. I deem it inexpedient to encumber the sidewalks in this manner.

On motion of Mr. Landry the veto was unanimously sustained.

Mr. Bertoli, Administrator of Waterworks and Public Buildings, presented his monthly report of the workings in his department for the months of February and March, 1875.

DEPARTMENT OF WATERWORKS AND PUBLIC BUILDINGS, April 6, 1875.

Hon. Charles J. Leedes, Mayor.

I would most respectfully submit the following report of collections for water rents for the months of February and March, as well as also the various buildings, markets, etc., repaired under the supervision of this department:

WATERWORKS.

Collections for February, 1875, \$500.00

Collections for March, 1875, 982.96

TOTAL, \$1,482.96

PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS.

This branch comprises the Insane Asylum, small-pox hospital and Home of Aged and Infirm, which are all in good condition, and provided with every convenience calculated to make them comfortable places of residence for the inmates. At present the employees of the former are engaged in painting, whitewashing and otherwise repairing and cleaning the interior of the building.

MARKET HOUSES.

The following markets have been repaired during the last two months at various times at the instance of the Department of Waterworks, viz: Magnolia, Port, Claiborne and Vegetable.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS.

Comprising Parish Prison, stationhouses, engine houses, etc., a great many of which have been repaired within a short time, viz: The Parish Prison, whose authorities are at present engaged in painting and whitewashing the interior, having been provided with the necessary materials by this department, also the plastering, which has been repaired; roof of fourth precinct station house, etc., enlarging opening of Lafayette No. 1's house, making new bell and repairing of Vigilant No. 3's engine house, etc.

CITY HALL.

This building has also been thoroughly overhauled—roof and valley gutters, iron gates, sinks, etc., which about comprise everything necessary.

COURTHOUSES.

These buildings have also been attended to, such as new floor in the sheriff's office, placing awnings at First District Court, repairing gas pipes, etc.

Mr. Pillsbury presented the joint monthly report of the Administrators of Finance and Public Accounts for the month of March, 1875; also report of collectors for same month in Department of Finance.

The communication from T. S. Hardee, City Surveyor, relative to the dangerous condition of the Bienville Draining Machine, was read and on motion of Mr. Landry referred to a special committee of three, the Administrator of Improvements to be chairman.

The Mayor appointed on said committee Messrs. Burke, Landry and Pillsbury.

Financial and Other Business on Final Passage.

Mr. Brown called up the ordinances described as follows, which having been read twice, were now on third reading, and they passed unanimously, the yeas and nays having been called on each, and all the members present at roll call voting:

An ordinance providing for the payment of the several accounts therein named, beginning "Firemen's Charitable Association."

"An ordinance making appropriations for charitable institutions for the quarter ending March 31, 1875."

Instructing the Administrator of Improvements to furnish to the Asylum of the "Little Sisters of the Poor," fifty loads of gravel ballast.

By Mr. Bouy, and adopted:

Resolution reducing assessments on the property of the estate of William Henderson, A. K. Joseph, Joseph Lorenz, J. F. Garnier, and John B. Lafitte.

By Mr. Brown and read twice:

An ordinance to appropriate and pay attorney's fees.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the city of New Orleans, That the sum of \$7.50 be appropriated for attorney's fees for services rendered in connection with the business of the City Attorney's office.

Be it further ordained, etc., That the Administrator of Public Accounts, upon application of the City Attorney, shall warrant
