WASHINGTON, May 4.—Besides the cases cases under the enforcement acts from Louisiana and Kentucky, which had been argued, the Supreme Court left over for decision another term. A former case from Minnesota, McIlhenny, receiver of the Southwestern Railroad Company vs. Coleman, three commercial cases—two from New York and one from Tennessee, and two patent cases, also from New York. The Judge's reply. MEMBERS OF THE CITY COURT OF BROOKLYN, Brooklyn, May 4, 1875. Mrs. Tilton: I am directed by Chief Justice Nelson to return your letter as it cannot be read in court; also to state that in civil cases counsel have a right to refrain from eliciting particular facts, and that it is the duty of the court to refuse to order the production of such facts, unless the judge also instructs me to say that the question of whether or not a witness is to be ordered to give another ground from that ordered when your husband was called and sworn. He was a competent witness to testify in his own behalf against a third person, a defendant, and while the policy of the law was to some extent involved, there was no express statute in the way; but the statute of May 10, 1867, expressly declares the wife to be incompetent as a witness for or against the husband.
