The manufacturer takes a quantity of simple sugar and water, but is generally ignorant of the fact that the following drugs and chemicals, which, in the order given, are more minutely detailed: Tartaric acid, which is obtained from the tartarous process of refining, commonly speaking, tartar, a peculiar substance which concretes on the inside of wine casks, being deposited there during the fermentation process. This substance, when purified and powdered, is a cream of tartar of the shops. Deprive this of its potash it contains, and the peculiar crystals of tartaric acid remain.
