Local Intelligence.

AN INTERNATIONAL POLICE QUESTION.—Yesterday evening the steamship State of Alabama sailed from this port, and her departure leaves many people in a quandary as to whether they have been hurt or not.

JUSTICE IN ALGIER.—Thomas Kenefice writes to complain of harsh usage in the Algiers justice's court. He had filed in the court, as a subrogee, a decree of the Third District Court, which the magistrate, Justice Thompson, refused to receive.

CHARGED WITH PERJURY.—Patrolman Roensch, of the second precinct police force, has made an affidavit against Sergeant Bibb for perjury. Bibb recently brought the patrolman before the Police Board on a charge of being absent from his beat, and on the trial it was shown that the sergeant was in the stationhouse at the identical time he swore he was searching for Roensch on his beat.

DEADLY TRAGEDY IN BALDWIN COUNTY, ALABAMA.—Partial reports of a terrible occurrence near the line of the Mobile and Montgomery railroads reached us by telegraph from the Junction of the two roads, and we could learn nothing definite. Yesterday we were called upon by Mr. W. J. Van Kirk of Millville, a surgeon, who was on duty near the scene of the tragedy, but not a witness to its occurrence.

TRANSFERRED.—The Police Board yesterday, on the recommendation of Superintendent Loan, transferred Corporal Hearnsey from the second precinct to Gretna, and Corporal Byron from Gretna to the second precinct. The intelligence of Corporal Hearnsey's transfer will be received with regret by the residents of the second precinct, he being a faithful and energetic officer.

COTTON CROP REPORT FOR JULY.—The committee on information and statistics of the New Orleans department of the National Cotton Exchange, composed of Messrs. Harrison Watts, chairman; R. De Gas, J. V. Richards, William A. Gray, R. Camus, Edward Morphy and W. C. Simmons, Jr., submit the following report for July:

LOUISIANA.—We have received 31 answers from 31 parishes, and their average date is to the fifteenth instant. The character of the weather is generally reported as favorable—more than the same period last year, though our latest dates bring us complaints of drought. The stands are generally good, and better than last year. The plant is blooming well, and the present condition is compared with last year, except in certain districts where rain is needed.

MISSISSIPPI.—One hundred letters have been received from thirty-two counties in this State, nearly all dated on the fifteenth of the month, their uniformity of date being a great improvement over the past. The character of the weather for the past month has been mainly favorable, with, however, considerable exceptions. ARKANSAS.—Forty answers received from twenty-one counties. The weather has been generally dry; occasional showers, however, have prevented any damage, and on the whole it has been more favorable than last year, and also the reports are generally good, and the plant fruiting remarkably well. The general condition is undoubtedly the finest known for a number of years, and exceeding some of our correspondence is as cheerful as could be desired.
