Local Intelligence.

HOUSE BLOWN DOWN AND A MAN KILLED.—During the storm which occurred between one and two o'clock yesterday evening, a number of men sought shelter in a frame house on the batture, head of Marengo street.

AN EMBELLER ARRESTED.—Special officer Heaney and Stahlinger yesterday arrested J. Ward on complaint of a Carondelet street broker, who says that accused, not many months ago, sold him some city scrip which had been obtained by false representations.

REGATTA AT BAY ST. LOUIS.—Next Monday there will be a sailing regatta for third class boats, the Adelia, Maggie Brewer and Cayuga are entered.

Next Tuesday Pass Christian will be celebrated by a regatta, the contest to be between the Adelia and the Cayuga, for \$1000. Of course there will be considerable excitement.

A SPIRITUAL LOVER.—About noon yesterday Johanna Sullivan was stabbed in the neck by Michael Delaney, at the corner of Delord and Baronne streets, with a pocket-knife, the blow severing the jugular.

The facts appear to be that Michael Delaney, who is a car driver, about twenty-four years old, has been paying attentions to her for some time, and induced her to promise to marry him. At this time she lived with Mr. Sullivan, her uncle, a boot cooper, who learned that Delaney had been married and had left his wife. Delaney asserted that he had obtained a divorce, and continued to pay his attentions as before. Mr. Sullivan gave his niece her choice to leave Delaney or live as a servant up town, where Delaney continued to visit her. Yesterday she concluded he was deceiving her, and told him she did not believe in a divorce, and would go back to her uncle. She went to Delaney's mother's house to obtain her clothes, and there he enticed her into a room and stabbed her.

She died profusely, and was carried to her uncle's house, corner of Masie and Goodchild streets, and is now in a very critical condition. Dr. Denis declaring the wound mortal. Delaney has not yet been arrested.

BEFORE JUDGE EVANS.—Felix Lougar, keeper of a private market, was up for violating the law, and the case continued. William Smith stole a coat from Mrs. Adeline Smith, so he goes down to see a judge.

John Smith hotbedded Colin Rafe, and he is committed for trial. Adeline Smith stole clothing from Mrs. M. Moreau, and now a jury will sit the case.

Officer J. Bennett arrested and imprisoned Mrs. Rozana Sweeney, and charged her with having disturbed the peace. Her imprisonment began on the second of July, and she was not released until the twenty-eighth of July. When taken before the recorder she was discharged, no one appearing to prosecute. Mrs. Sweeney has determined to do a little protesting, to have revenge for an uncommenced prosecution.

The policeman goes to the First District Court. William Hayward picked a man's pocket of a small sum of money while the two were taking a friendly drink, at the corner of Liberty and Poydras streets. To the First District Court.

A singular affidavit was made yesterday by Mrs. Margaret Littlefield, who states that one year ago, last May, when her husband was living, she wished to obtain \$500, and spoke to one of her acquaintances about the matter. This mutual friend instructed her as to the manner of proceeding in such a case. He induced her to make a note for the amount required, and he would easily obtain currency on it, as she owned considerable property. Mrs. Littlefield failed to get the money or the note, and now prosecutes her friend as an embezzler. The case was fixed to be heard next week.

POLICE WORK LAST MONTH.—Total number of arrests in this district, 1764. Of these 117 were males and 587 females. The first precinct, as usual, had the largest number, 510. Strong drink caused most of the trouble.

A SECOND HAND STORE ROBBED.—Some time during Wednesday night burglars went through the second hand store of J. Bezon, corner of Dauphine and St. Louis streets. The rascals had no delicacy about taking any valuables they could find.

BRIEF MENTION.—Superintendent Loan yesterday returned command at police headquarters. An inquest was held on the body of L. Roberts, and a verdict returned that death was caused by John Gray.

There was a bit of the yesterday in a house owned by A. J. Aloza, and occupied by Mrs. Gerard. The fire was in the roof, but before it gained much headway was extinguished by policemen. The building is on Claiborne, near LaHarpe street.

Ten babies of hay were burned on the levee. Rachel Perkins, a servant, is in prison in the seventh precinct, charged by J. C. Anco with perjury.

Early yesterday morning, three burglars tackled the store of Mr. Schmidt, corner of Claiborne and Damaine streets, and were detected by a policeman. Finding that they were discovered they fled, dropping two wedges and a chisel. After a long chase one of them, Hugh Kennedy, was caught, but the others ran successful foot races.

A burglar entered the house of Mrs. Cornejo, No. 323 Magazine street, and collected some jewelry, but in operating made sufficient noise to arouse some of the sleepers, who fired several shots at the thief. There was no sign that the shooters are wheat and oats continue to arrive from Texas.

Nathan Brown objected to C. White, D. Dixon and Peter Blue making a target of his body, therefore caused their arrest. Dixon came back and swears that Nathan wanted to kill him, down in the Third District.
