McCOMB CITY.

A Southern Improvement.

EDITOR REPUBLICAN: An excursion trip to McComb City, on the Jackson railroad, is a recreation that all can and should enjoy.

McComb City is a wonder. It has grown suddenly into existence, almost as the work of magic.

The manufacturing and repairing works of the Jackson railroad are here, and with their immense buildings and complete equipments, form, no doubt, the most perfect establishment of the kind in the South.

It is evident that McComb City has every advantage, so far as financial backing is concerned, for a fine and flourishing inland town.

It would seem that the time has now arrived for extending the improvements of the town upon another plan.

Our impressions are founded, thus far, from a mere Sunday excursion visit, when everything was at rest.

Ku-Klux of Southern Illinois. The murder of a man named Sinesy, at Carbondale, Illinois, and the disturbances in Franklin and Randolph counties, as well as in Williamson, have more certainly revealed the existence of an organized band of outlaws in the southern part of Illinois.

The DeSoto House is worthy of special mention. It is an immense structure, perhaps a hundred feet or more in length, three stories high, composed of spacious halls, rooms and galleries, all well designed for the promotion of comfort.

Among other public houses there is a schoolhouse, or academy, a large and tastefully constructed building, where a good school is kept.

The wonder of all these fine improvements is that they have arisen in a day, or literally, in about two years. They are the product of the enterprise and the large wealth of the gentlemen composing the railroad company and the Mississippi Valley Company.

Board of Health.

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Official advice from the Rio Grande. The military telegraph from the Rio Grande is being continuously cut. The line has been working for two weeks without trouble of any kind.

The Indian Bureau has been informed by the Sioux commissioners that they will meet at Omaha on the twenty-sixth instant, to proceed to the treaty agency, where the grand council will be held September first.

NEW YORK.

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John D. Townsend, counsel for the legislative committee on crime, presented voluminous charges to Mayor Wickham, containing specifications against Police Commissioner Michael D. Veech, and asking for their removal for neglect of duty, incapacity for office and other serious allegations.

FOREIGN.

Austrian Intervention Declined. BERLIN, August 20.—It is said that Austria has refused, under guarantee of the Northern European powers, to intervene for the pacification of the Herzegovina upon a basis of reform in the administration of the Christian provinces of Turkey, but that the Porte has refused the offer.

PARIS, August 20.—The Catholic Congress convened at Poitiers to-day. The Archbishop of New Orleans preached the opening sermon.

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Vienna speaks to La Liberté. Prince Milan, of Serbia, has addressed a note to the powers who signed the treaty of Paris, complaining that he has not been informed of their action in regard to the inscription which is extending into Serbia, and which seems to threaten to assume proportions which may render its suppression impossible.

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
