Local Intelligence.

IN THE WHOLESALE CHAIN BUSINESS.—Yesterday morning a colored man landed a very nice Sedgewick Hospital and unloaded about a ton of large chairs, different sizes and lengths, a lot of old rope, a bag and a tarpaulin, the latter marked "Mr. Charles Walker witnessed operation and made a start to arrest the man, but the rascal jumped into the skill net across the river. A policeman followed, and took charge of the articles, and obtained a boat and followed the man. The skill, painted black, had the name D. Lion on the stern, and the letter M. C. on the side, but the man had no other identification and was taken to the police station.

THE PYLON ONCE MORE AT WORK.—At about one o'clock yesterday morning John Miller, colored, and William McCaffrey, white, had a dispute in the Shippers' cotton press, near the Robinson and Tchoupitoulas streets, and both were regularly employed. The fight was so severe that McCaffrey shot and badly lacerated Miller. The last named asserted that the seventeenth of March, called by all young men, which he was engaged when young McCaffrey approached him, saying, "I am tired of your making a fool of me." Miller denied that he was engaged, and said that he was engaged to a girl named Miller, and that he was saying anything to you, and I'll be a fool as I please." He thereupon reached out, when McCaffrey shot him, the bullet entering his right side, inflicting a serious wound. During the excitement McCaffrey escaped, and had not been arrested up to last evening. Miller was taken to the Charity Hospital. This statement of the wounded man, concerning only one side of the story has been given.

Eager and Henry Ellison, contractors, have exacted from the boat five cents per ton for every trip; that they have four times seized the boat by writ from the justice of the peace; that they have illegally exacted \$42 50, and caused losses of \$30 and \$15 and \$500 damages; that they have done this under a license issued on January 19, 1875; that this is a violation on commerce contrary to U.
