SENATE. Sixth Day's Session. SENATE CHAMBER, New Orleans, January 10, 1876.

The Senate met pursuant to adjournment at twelve o'clock M., the Hon. C. C. Antoine, Lieutenant Governor and President of the Senate, in the chair.

On a call of the roll, the following Senators answered to their names: Present—Messrs. Alexander, Allain, Anderson, Blackburn, Blunt, Breaux, Burch, Detiege, Dumont, George, Goode, Gray, Harter, Herwig, Kelso, Kelly, Ogden, Robertson, Stevens, Sypher, Twitcomb, Weber, White, Whitney, Young—27.

Prayer was then offered by Rev. Mr. Dardis. (Senator Anderson in the chair.) Senator Weber rose to a question of privilege, sent to the Secretary's desk, and had read an article from the New Orleans Democrat of January 9, headed, "A Smitten Parish," and made the following remarks thereon:

I came to West Feliciana in June, 1865, with a stock of goods valued at over \$1000, for reference to D. Blum, Frank & Haas, Blum, Stern & Co., B. Riehl & Co., F. F. Martinez, Katz & Barnett, and other firms which I bought goods from and do not recollect the names of now. I became very successful in business, and continued so until 1867 and 1868, when I became imbued with one of the noblest of causes—the Republican cause—as elected to office, and have since been the scapegoat for all kinds of abuses, ostracism and persecution.

At the time that I went into politics the records will show that I owned in my own name and for my own account two valuable lots well improved in the town of St. Francisville; on one lot I had a store which cost me fully \$4000 to build. My stock of goods at that time was valued at least \$10,000. This is the property said to be "considerable town property, well improved."

In January, 1873, my store and its contents were destroyed by fire and were a total loss. The store and contents were insured for \$5000; the insurance companies paid me in cash \$8000, and with that money I bought a tax collector's office, more acres of land, which I acknowledge that I own in my name.

The assertions of the Democrat, that the "country men understand that the white people of Louisiana are not responsible for their official existence," etc., are assertions that I return to the author with the utter contempt they deserve, and with a total loss of all respect. I am a Republican, and I do not care to be associated with the willful and malicious falsehoods published by the Property Holders' Union of West Feliciana as frauds on journalism, more infamous than the most unprincipled and the vilest of slanders.

The only criminal act that I, Representative Armistead and ex-Senator Breaux are guilty of is that, I suppose, of being Republicans, and I am not ashamed to own it, and the others because I dare assert my manhood even in the community where the wonderful falsifiers reside. Now we come to the Pelicans Ledger, which is said to have become my property since the middle of the year 1873. This patriotic Democrat has been so truthful that I am almost afraid to contradict any more of its statements. But we must have the facts, and the truth will out. Its assertion is a barefaced falsehood, and here is the proof. I bought the Ledger in the middle of the year 1872 from Mr. G. J. Howell, of St. Francisville, and paid for it in cash. It has been my property, and has been edited by me as a Republican newspaper ever since.

On motion of Senator Burch the report was referred to the Committee on Unfinished Business. Senator Weber submitted the following report from the Committee on Health and Quarantine: COMMITTEE ON HEALTH AND QUARANTINE, New Orleans, January 9, 1876.

To the Honorable President and Members of the Senate: Your committee beg leave to report, on Senate bill No. 47, an act to provide for the burial of indigent persons dying within certain limits of the city of New Orleans, to provide for the payment of the same and for other purposes, favorably. Respectedly submitted, E. L. WEBER, Chairman.

and re-nact section 191 of Ray's Revised Statutes. Of a bill to be entitled an act relative to the enforcement of hypothecary rights, and defining the jurisdiction of courts therefor. Of a bill to be entitled an act relative to judicial sales, and sales days. Of a bill to be entitled an act relative to the trial of motions, rules, exceptions, and answers to dissolve conservatory suits; and providing for judgments against principals and sureties on the bond.

Of a bill to be entitled an act relative to administrators and executors residing out of the State. Of a bill to be entitled an act to provide for the revival of judgments when the defendant has changed his domicile. Of a bill to be entitled an act to provide for the revival of judgments rendered by the district courts of the State prior to the organization of the judiciary under the constitution of 1868, when the amount sued for did not exceed \$500, exclusive of interest.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS. By Mr. Weber: Resolved, That a committee of three members of the Senate shall be appointed by the President, immediately after the passage of this resolution, whose duty shall be to ascertain whether the Governor, acting in his official capacity, has sent in to the Senate, for confirmation, the name of such person or persons requiring confirmation, nominated as a commissioner by him, as required by section 57 of the constitution; that said committee shall make a full and detailed report of any and all such violations to the Senate, ten days from and after its appointment, and that they shall have power to send for persons and papers. Lies over under the rules.

Mr. Whitney moved to take from the table the following motion of Senator Chadbourn: I move that the office of assistant secretary of the Senate be and is hereby declared vacant, and that the Senate do now proceed to elect an assistant secretary. The Senate voted to take the motion from the table. Senator Chadbourn moved the adoption of the motion.

On motion of Senator Whitney the further consideration of the motion was postponed until to-morrow at 1 P. M. Senator Blackburn rose to a point of inflection, and asked if an officer elected by the Senate could be removed, or the said office be declared vacant by a simple majority, or if it required a two-thirds vote of the Senate.

The President, Senator Anderson in the chair, informed the Senator that in accordance with a decision rendered by the President of the Senate on a previous occasion, the Senate had a right to declare at any time any elective office of the Senate vacant. Senator Young called for executive session. Executive session having been raised, on a call of the roll the following Senators answered to their names:

The bill was read a second time, and, on motion of Senator Burch, referred to the Committee on Appropriation, when appointed. Senator Whitney moved to reconsider the vote by which his motion to postpone the consideration of the election of an assistant secretary was adopted.

On motion of Senator Burch, the report was ordered to be referred to the appropriate committee when appointed. NOTICES OF BILLS. and re-nact section 191 of Ray's Revised Statutes. The proceedings were opened with prayer offered by the Rev. Father Hubert, of the Roman Catholic Church. The journal of yesterday was read, and, pending which, on motion of Mr. Pipes, the further reading of the same was dispensed with; and, on motion of Mr. Dupre, it was approved.

ELECTION OF UNITED STATES SENATOR. Mr. Kidd moved that the House do now proceed to the election of a United States Senator. Mr. Lowell asked and obtained leave to present the following protest, which was read and ordered to be spread upon the minutes: We, the undersigned members of the House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana, entertaining the belief that there is no vacancy in the United States Senate from this State, the General Assembly elected in 1872, on the second Tuesday after the organization of its first regular session, to wit: January 3, 1873, according to the form of law having elected the Hon. P. B. S. Thibault United States Senator for the term ending March 4, 1875, can not consistently participate in an attempt to elect a United States Senator; we therefore submit this our formal protest against this proposed act. Hunacker, of St. James; Mr. Walker moved the following as an amendment to Mr. Kidd's motion, to wit: That it be adopted that whereas the question of election of United States Senator has arisen in this House, that while this House recognizes the fact of an existing vacancy in the office of Senator of the United States for the State of Louisiana, it is in the sense of this House of Representatives that it is a point of order that the people of Louisiana for a Senator now to be chosen by the suffrages of a Senate and House not entirely representative of the people, and in part composed in contradiction to the popular will as expressed in the general elections. And further, that this House at present sits and recognizes the present composition as in part de facto and not de jure, and only for the purpose of indispensable proceedings for the relief of the State.

Mr. Lowell arose to a point of order, to wit: That under the rules of the House Mr. Walker's motion had to lie over one day. The Chair ruled Mr. Lowell's point of order not well taken, for the following reasons, to wit: The gentleman from Jackson having moved that this House do now proceed to the election of a United States Senator, and the gentleman from Orleans having offered a substitute to the motion of the gentleman from Jackson, the Chair rules that the substitute offered by the gentleman from Orleans can be entertained without a suspension of the rules.

Mr. Matthews, of Tensas, inquired from the Speaker, whether there was any official information received in relation to a vacancy of United States Senator from this State. The Speaker answered in the negative. Mr. Lowell arose to a point of order, that inasmuch as Mr. Walker's motion, amending Mr. Kidd's motion was sent in writing to the desk and read to the House, it came in the form of an order, and consequently, had to lie over under the rules. The Speaker ruled the point of order of

Mr. Lowell well taken for the following reasons: Mr. Lowell, of Jefferson, raised the point of order, that the substitute offered by Mr. Walker, of Orleans, being in the nature of an order or resolution, could not be entertained without a suspension of the rules. The Chair ruled the point of order well taken, because it was in the nature of an order or resolution, and it came under rule No. 33, and could not be entertained on the day presented, unless by a vote of two-thirds of the members present. Mr. Kidd moved that the House take a recess until 3 P. M.

Mr. Lowell moved to adjourn until twelve o'clock M. to-morrow, and on that motion Mr. Wilson called for the yeas and nays, which resulted as follows: Yeas—Messrs.
