On Monday, the seventeenth instant, the Senator and Representatives from Louisiana figure largely in the Congressional Record.

Mr. West—In the Senate, by unanimous consent obtained leave to introduce a bill for the relief of the registry of the Circuit Court of the United States for the Fifth Judicial Circuit and District of Louisiana.

The Chief Clerk read as follows: A bill for the relief of the registry of the Circuit Court of the United States for the Fifth Judicial Circuit and District of Louisiana.

Be it enacted, etc., That the Secretary of the Treasury be and he is hereby authorized and directed to return to the registry of the Circuit Court of the United States for the Fifth Judicial Circuit and District of Louisiana the sum of \$15,000.00, gold.

When the recent decision of the Supreme Court of the United States was rendered, the Congress of the United States and the interests of the people were confronted with the proposition that not only was the magnificent donation of bonds that was made to those companies in 1862 irrevocably to the loss of the government, but that the accruing interest for thirty years would accumulate, according to the admission of the companies themselves, to a sum that would eventually involve entire loss.

I beg leave, therefore, Mr. President, to introduce a bill, and will explain its provisions in a few words. The act of 1862 originally stipulated that the entire earnings of the roads for government business should be reserved as against the payment of interest and the principal of the bonds.

An ordinance adopting an estimate of expenditures of the city of New Orleans for the year 1876.

Be it ordained by the Council of the city of New Orleans, That the following estimate of expenditures (including police and schools) for the year 1876 be and the same is hereby adopted.

Department of Improvements—Streets, wages, etc. \$265,900 00. Streets, repairs, etc. 68,625 00. Streets, bridges, crossings and wings 80,025 00.

Department of Waterworks and Public Buildings—Waterworks, pipes, machinery, etc. \$30,000 00. Public squares, salaries and wages 7,200 00.

Department of Commerce—Salaries and wages 25,300 00. Office expenses 700 00. Department of Public Accounts—Salaries 15,000 00.

Department of Assessments—Salaries 5,100 00. Office expenses 400 00. Assessment rolls (State) 16,000 00.

Mayor's Office—Salaries 5,400 00. Office expenses 860 00. City Hall Building—Salaries of librarian, keeper of archives, janitor and porters 5,000 00.
