THE SENATE YESTERDAY. Eighteenth Day's Session. SENATE CHAMBER, New Orleans, January 26, 1876.

The Senate met pursuant to adjournment, at twelve o'clock M. The Hon. C. C. Antoine, Lieutenant Governor and President of the Senate, in the Chair.

On call of the roll the following Senators answered to their names: Present—Messrs. Alexander, Anderson, Blunt, Breaux, Burch, Cane, Chabroux, Dejeu, George, Goode, Grover, Harper, Laury, Ogdin, Pollard, Robertson, Spyer, Weber, White, Whitney, Young.

On motion of Senator Brewster, the constitutional rule was suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, and the joint resolution was placed upon its second reading and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

By Senator Brewster: Joint resolution No. 7, instructing the Senators and requesting the Representatives of Louisiana in Congress to secure the passage by the national legislature, of an act granting appropriate pensions to the veterans of the war with Mexico, their widows and minor orphans.

By Senator Brewster: Joint resolution No. 6, instructing the Senators and requesting the Representatives of Louisiana in Congress to secure, if possible, the passage of an act by the national legislature appropriating the proceeds of the cotton tax collected in the States of Missouri, Tennessee, Arkansas, Mississippi and Louisiana, to the construction and repair of a system of levees upon the Mississippi river and its tributaries, to be constructed and maintained under national supervision and control.
