From the Monroe Telegraph, January 28: The body of Anthony Smith, the teacher, whose anticlericalism we noticed on the fourteenth, was recovered at Bry's mill, on Sunday, not far below the point at which Smith threw himself into the river.

From the Shreveport Times, January 27: A man named Comtesse, belonging to the Seventh Regiment of United States Cavalry, stationed here, committed suicide Tuesday night by placing the muzzle of his gun in his mouth and literally blowing the top of his head off. No motive for the rash act is known.

From the Southern, January 27: Mr. William Harris, the largest rice planter on the Mississippi river above New Orleans, has moved his family into this parish, and now resides in the neighborhood where he is cultivating 1300 acres this year. He made 10,000 barrels of rice last year.

From the Metairie, January 28: Last week we chronicled the death of Mr. Norbert Perret, a veteran of 1841-45. On Thursday of this week Mr. P. A. Becnel, another member of the hero band commanded by Captain Jacob was gathered to his companions in arms.

From the North Louisiana Journal, January 28: At the adjourned railroad meeting held at Tallulah on the nineteenth instant, the people composing said meeting determined to have the surveying done as soon as practicable, and there is every indication that the enterprise of building the proposed narrow gauge railroad will be begun at an early day.
