THE SENATE YESTERDAY. Twenty-third Day's Session.

SENATE CHAMBER, New Orleans, February 1, 1876.

The Senate met pursuant to adjournment at twelve o'clock M., the Hon. C. C. Antoine, Lieutenant Governor and President of the Senate, in the chair.

On a call of the roll, the following Senators answered to their names: Present—Messrs. Alexander, Allain, Anderson, Blackburn, Blunt, Brexner, Brewster, Burch, Dejeu, George, Goode, Greene, Harper, Kelly, Landry, Masciot, Ogden, Pollard, Stamps, Sypher, Whitney, Young.

Prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. Bryant. The journal was read, corrected and approved.

PETITIONS AND MEMORIALS. Senator Burch submitted a petition from two thousand videangues of New Orleans, asking for the repeal of act No. 46 of 1874, creating the New Orleans Sanitary and Refrigerating Company.

On motion of Senator Young the petition was referred to the Committee on Corporations and Parochial Affairs.

Senator White submitted a petition from the Sisters of Charity in charge of the Female Orphan Asylum on Camp street, which was referred to the Committee on Charitable Institutions.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES. Senator Twitchell, from the Committee on Corporations and Parochial Affairs, submitted the following report:

resolution was referred to the Committee on Federal Relations. RESOLUTIONS. By Senator Burch: Resolved, That the President of the Senate appoint a special committee of three, whose duties shall be to inquire into the case of the wharves of the city of New Orleans, and into the legality of the wharf improvement bonds for whose liquidation said wharves were leased; and that said special persons and papers, and to administer oaths.

Lies over. Senator Blackburn offered the following motion: I move that the Secretary of the Senate be and is hereby instructed to have printed a calendar every morning and placed upon the desk of each Senator.

Senator Wharton moved, as a substitute, that the Secretary be instructed to have a calendar printed each morning in lieu of the journal.

Adopted. SPECIAL ORDER OF THE DAY. Senator White called up the special order of the day, being Senate bill No. 83, substitute for Senate bills No. 4 and 17, entitled an act to amend and re-enact article 163 of Code of Practice.

On motion of Senator White the bill was considered engrossed. On motion of Senator White the constitutional rules were suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate to place the bill upon its third reading and final passage.

The bill was adopted upon its third reading, and was finally passed, its title adopted and ordered to be sent to the House for concurrence.

On motion of Senator Brexner, House bill No. 180, entitled an act to amend and re-enact article 64 of the Code of Practice, and to repeal all laws and parts of laws in conflict with the provisions of this act, was taken up.

The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion of Senator Chabourn the report of the committee was adopted. On motion of Senator Sypher, the report of the Committee on Corporations and Parochial Affairs on House bill No. 115 was taken up, as follows:

COMMITTEE ON CORPORATIONS AND PAROCHIAL AFFAIRS, February 1, 1876.

To the Honorable President and Members of the Senate: Your Committee on Corporations and Parochial Affairs report favorably on the following bill: House bill No. 115, an act to change the name of the town of Brashear to Morgan City, and to incorporate the town of Brashear in the parish of St. Mary, approved April 27, 1871.

HOUSE BILLS ON FIRST READING. Senator Harper moved to take up all House bills on their first reading. Adopted.

House bill No. 145, entitled an act to amend and re-enact section 1021 of the Revised Statutes of Louisiana. The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Claims.

HOUSE BILLS ON FIRST READING. Senator Harper moved to take up all House bills on their first reading. Adopted.

House bill No. 31, entitled an act to legitimate Louise Celina Duveigneaud, Joseph Gustave Duveigneaud, Marie Therese Julia Duveigneaud, Louise Duveigneaud, Pierre Duveigneaud, and Marie Julia Odette Duveigneaud, children of Joseph Duveigneaud and his wife, Marie Julia Freid.

The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

HOUSE BILLS ON FIRST READING. Senator Harper moved to take up all House bills on their first reading. Adopted.

House bill No. 59, entitled an act to define the object of drainage assessments, and to regulate the collection of the same, and to prevent judgments for assessments being rendered as personal judgments, and to repeal so much of act No. 57, approved March 1, 1861, as make such judgments personal, and to confine the execution under assessment judgments to the property in which the assessment is levied.

The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Finance.

HOUSE BILLS ON FIRST READING. Senator Harper moved to take up all House bills on their first reading. Adopted.

House bill No. 37, entitled an act giving parties accused of crime the right to testify as witnesses on their trial. The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

HOUSE BILLS ON FIRST READING. Senator Harper moved to take up all House bills on their first reading. Adopted.

House bill No. 80, entitled an act to organize the police of the city of New Orleans. The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

HOUSE BILLS ON FIRST READING. Senator Harper moved to take up all House bills on their first reading. Adopted.

And the motion to lay on the table was adopted. The bill was then adopted, on its second reading and calendered.

Senator Wharton asked and obtained unanimous consent to take up House bill No. 66, entitled an act to incorporate the town of St. Martinville, in the parish of St. Martin, and to extend its limits, and to define the duties and powers of its officers, etc.

The bill was read the first time. On motion of Senator Wharton, the constitutional rules were suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Corporations and Parochial Affairs.

Senator Wharton asked and obtained unanimous consent to call up House bill No. 144, entitled an act to determine the qualification of jurors in the parishes of Vermillion, Lafayette, Iberis, St. Martin, Cameron and Calcasieu.

The bill was read the first time. On motion of Senator Wharton, the constitutional rules were suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE. The Chief Clerk of the House was announced with the following message: HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, New Orleans, February 1, 1876.

To the Honorable President and Members of the Senate: I am directed by the House of Representatives to request the concurrence of your honorable body on the following House bills: House bill No. 15, an act for the relief of the heirs of Solomon LaBranch.

HOUSE BILLS ON FIRST READING. Senator Landry: Senator bill No. 104, entitled an act for the relief of Thomas O'Malley, of the parish of Ascension, to pay him for constructing levees in the parish of Ascension, and providing a means of paying and funding of the same.

The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Claims.

HOUSE BILLS ON FIRST READING. Senator Harper moved to take up all House bills on their first reading. Adopted.

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and to create a Police Board therein, and limiting the cost of same. The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed on its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Metropolitan Police.

House bill No. 101, entitled an act to provide for the uniform assessment of property in the city of New Orleans; defining the duty of the Administrator of Assessments of said city; fixing the limit of expense to be paid; abolishing the office of State assessor for the parish of Orleans; providing that no separate State assessments shall be made within the parish, and repealing all laws or parts of laws in conflict or inconsistent with this act.

The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed on its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Finance.

House bill No. 134, entitled an act to suspend the collection of all drainage taxes in the city of New Orleans until January 1, 1878; and to stay all executions to enforce payment thereof until that time.

The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Drainage, Canals and Inland Navigation.

House bill No. 151, entitled an act to amend and re-enact section thirteen, of act No. 9, approved February 27, 1871, styled an act to provide for the supply in the loss of public record and other papers consumed by the burning of the courthouse in the parish of Morehouse on the sixteenth of March, 1870.

The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Corporations and Parochial Affairs.

House bill No. 177, entitled an act relative to the day of demand, payment and protest of promissory notes, bills of exchange and commercial paper maturing on holidays.

The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading, and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

HOUSE BILLS ON FIRST READING. Senator Burch moved the adoption of the resolution: Resolved, That the Committee on Public Education be and is hereby instructed to investigate whether there is a bona fide Agricultural and Mechanical College, under act No. 125 of the session of 1874, and whether said institution is in keeping with the act of Congress, session of 1861, and subsequent amendments, and that the committee have power to send for persons and papers.

Senator Burch moved the adoption of the resolution. Adopted.

Senator Burch asked and obtained unanimous consent to take up joint resolution No. 5, entitled a joint resolution to instruct the Attorney General to institute proceedings to forfeit the franchises, rights and privileges conferred on the Mississippi and Mexican Gulf Ship Canal Company, under act No. 39 of the acts of 1871, entitled an act for the drainage of New Orleans.

The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading and referred to the Committee on Drainage, Canals and Inland Navigation.

Senator Robertson asked and obtained unanimous consent to take up the report of the Judiciary Committee on House bill No. 36, reading as follows: Your Committee on Judiciary report favorably on House bill No. 36, entitled an act to increase the number of jurors drawn for service in the parish of Claiborne and to limit the time of their service.

T. C. ANDERSON, Chairman. On motion of Senator Robertson, the report was adopted.

On motion of Senator Robertson, the bill was adopted upon its second reading. The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed on its third reading, and notice of concurrence ordered sent to the House.

Senator Burch asked and obtained unanimous consent to take up House bill No. 141, entitled an act to enroll the charter of the Pelican Hook and Ladder Company No. 1, of the city of Baton Rouge, State of Louisiana. The bill was read the first time.

On motion of Senator Burch the bill was adopted upon its second reading. On motion of Senator Burch the constitutional rules were suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its third reading and final passage, title adopted, and notice of concurrence ordered sent to the House.

Senator White asked and obtained unanimous consent to take up the report of the Judiciary Committee on Senate bill No. 30, reading as follows: Your Committee on Judiciary report favorably on Senate bill No. 30, an act entitled an act to further define and extend the jurisdiction of the parish courts of this State.

On motion of Senator White, the bill was considered engrossed. On motion of Senator White, the constitutional rules were suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its third reading and final passage, title adopted, and ordered sent to the House for concurrence.

The following communication was received from the Governor: STATE OF LOUISIANA, Executive Department, New Orleans, January 31, 1876.

To the Honorable President and Members of the Senate: I am directed by the Governor to inform you that he has this day received, approved and signed an act originating in your honorable body, entitled an act appointing the State into senatorial districts, and fixing the number of Representatives to be elected from each parish

and representative district in the State, and designating in what senatorial districts Senators are to be elected at the next general election, and distributing the representative number of population, and repealing all laws or parts of laws contrary to or in conflict with the provisions of this act.

The constitutional rules being suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote of the Senate, the bill was placed upon its second reading and referred to the Committee on Claims.

Senator Young called for the report of the Committee on Commerce, Agriculture and Manufactures on Senate bill No. 7, reading as follows: COMMITTEE ON COMMERCE, AGRICULTURE AND MANUFACTURES, February 1, 1876.

To the Honorable President and Members of the Senate: Your committee beg leave to report favorably, with amendments, on act entitled an act to exempt from seizure growing and ungathered crops, and repeal all laws contrary thereto.

JOHNE BREAUX, Chairman; JACQUES A. GLA, D. YOUNG, ALLEN GREENE, JAMES H. GROVER. Amendment to section one: "Provided, that nothing in this act shall affect or impair the rights of those holding mortgage notes, secured by mortgage upon any landed estate, as recognized under existing laws."

Senator Young moved the adoption of the report. On motion of Senator Wharton, the Senate was declared adjourned until tomorrow at twelve o'clock M.
