Perry-Clark Rev's Session.
SENATE CHAMBER,
New Orleans, March 3, 1876.
The Senate met pursuant to adjournment at twelve o'clock M., the Hon. C. C. Antoine, Lieutenant Governor and President of the Senate, in the chair.
On call of the roll the following Senators answered to their names:

Prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. Bryant.
The journal was read, corrected and approved.

MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE.
The Chief Clerk of the House was announced with the following message:
House of Representatives,
New Orleans, March 3, 1876.
To the Honorable President and Members of the Senate:
I am directed by the House of Representatives to inform your honorable body of the passage of the following bills originating in said House, to wit:
House bill No. 363, entitled an act to define and limit the liability of the owners of the management of taxable property in this State.
House bill No. 355, entitled an act to abolish the parish of Carroll, and to create and establish in lieu thereof the two parishes of East Carroll and West Carroll, etc.
House bill No. 432, entitled an act for the relief of L. Delhomme, offered as a substitute for the resolution of the Senate, as instructed by the Committee on Claims.
House bill No. 433, entitled an act to authorize the parish of Lafourche and the town of Thibodaux to issue bonds for drainage purposes, and to provide for taxation, etc.
House bill No. 435, entitled an act to regulate railroads companies running their tracks through or into the city of New Orleans; to prevent their obstructing the streets, roads, levees, wharves and highways of said city; to interfere with commerce or the public use, etc.
House bill No. 509, entitled an act to provide for the transfer of certain cases from the courts of the parish of Orleans to the courts of the parish of Orleans, together with records, transcripts and documents, etc.
House bill No. 543, entitled an act for the relief of the widow and children of Judge John J. Morgan, deceased.
And also inform your honorable body that the House has concurred in the following bills sent from your body:
Senate bill No. 72, entitled an act creating a special levee district within certain limits prescribed in this act.
Senate bill No. 85, entitled an act fixing the fees of the clerks of the district courts throughout the State, the parish of Orleans excepted, and providing the manner of collecting the same.
Senate bill No. 120, entitled an act granting to the Charity Hospital, Medical College of New Orleans, the right to confer degrees and grant diplomas.
Senate bill No. 128, entitled an act giving intervenors the right to bond property attached, sequestered, or provisionally seized, and prescribing the manner of doing so.
Senate bill No. 137, entitled an act to amend section one of an act entitled an act to amend and re-enact sections one, seven, forty-nine, fifty-six, sixty-one, sixty-six, and seventy-five and seventy-seven, of an act entitled an act to provide a revenue, etc.
Senate bill No. 146, entitled an act to amend article 644 of the Code of Practice, etc.
Senate bill No. 160, entitled an act to incorporate the town of Greenwood, parish of Cadeau.
Senate bill No. 163, entitled an act to establish a board of audit for the parish of Cadeau.
And also that the House has concurred in the amendments to the following bills sent from your body:
House bill No. 484, entitled an act making an appropriation of \$175,309 00 out of the general funds in the State treasury, or received in the treasury during the year 1875, and the sum of \$682 85 to pay the deficiencies of the regular and extra sessions of 1875, etc.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

To the Honorable President and Members of the Senate:
I am directed by your honorable body to inform you of the passage of the following bills originating in the House of Representatives, to wit:
House bill No. 372, entitled an act to incorporate the town of Houma, in the parish of Terrebonne; to define the boundaries thereof, and to provide for the government of said town, etc.
House bill No. 413, entitled an act to enroll the charter of Washington Steam Fire Engine Company No. 1 of the city of Baton Rouge, State of Louisiana.
House bill No. 437, entitled an act to divide the city of New Orleans into two municipal police court districts; to establish two municipal police courts therein, and to provide for the appointment of a recorder for each of said courts, etc.
House bill No. 544, entitled an act to authorize the Auditor of Public Accounts to issue a warrant in favor of Mrs. Mary A. Bergen, etc.
And also call the signature of the presiding officer of the Senate to the said House bill No. 482, an act making an appropriation paying the expenses of the General Assembly, etc.
Also an act to fix the time of holding the regular term of the ninth judicial district court in and for the parish of Vernon; both signed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

On motion of Senator Wharton the journal was corrected by expunging all that portion relative to the arraignment of Senator Robertson.
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
