Mr. Dieruff's Petition. In the Common, Mr. Dieruff moved a second reading of the title bill, which declares that the title of the sovereign shall be Victoria, by the grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, defender of the faith, and Empress of India.

Mr. Dieruff refuted the objections that the title Empress was not English, and the colonies were neglected. He declared the colonies were Englishmen.

Mr. Maurice Brooks, Home Rule member from Dublin city, and Mr. J. M. Conboy, assuming the new title, would extend clerical to Fenian convicts.

Mr. Dieruff promised to reply to this question when he returned to the House. Mr. Samuelson, member from Danbury, and an advanced Liberal, attacked the proposed change and moved an adjournment.

The Status of the Carlists. A royal decree permits the Carlists who fled from the country since the first of February to return to Spain, if they do so within forty days. Leaders must first swear allegiance. But all Carlists who formerly held offices in Spain are excluded.

The newspapers announce that General Malin has been ordered to request the French government to expel all Spanish republicans in France.

Another Impediment to Peace. BERLIN, March 9.—A fresh difficulty in the way of peace has occurred in Turkey. The Christian subjects of the Sultan who have hitherto been exempt from military duty now refuse to pay the exemption tax, and military service is demanded.

A New Insurrection. SAN SEBASTIAN, March 9.—Some Carlist officers have received a circular from Ruiz Zorita advising them to request the French government to expel all Spanish republicans in France.

Ready at a Moment's Notice. VIENNA, March 9.—Belgrade newspapers report that the Serbian militia were reviewed yesterday. The commandant informed the troops that they must be ready to march at any moment.

The Turkish Defeat. RAGUSA, March 9.—Advices from Solovoo report that the Turks were defeated on Monday at Metrovizza, losing 1000 killed and many wounded.

Cuban Insurgents Discouraged. HAVANA, March 9.—It is reported the late serious engagement disheartened the insurgents. Their leader, Betancourt, and several of his officers were killed at Carthagenas on the third.

Congratulations. In reply to congratulatory telegrams of the Spanish Casinos, King Alfonso sent a dispatch saying: "The peace in Spain is the foremoster of the Spaniards, which the army will soon obtain in Cuba."

The Captain General's Projected Reforms. It is expected several important decrees affecting the island will be issued by the Captain General in a few days.

Insurgent Deaths. The insurgents, commanded by Vicente Garcia, attacked the town of Puerto Padre on the night of February 24. The Spaniards, led by the general in command, Echea, repulsed the rebels without any loss.
