Local Intelligence.

THINKS IT A BAD JOB.—Several days ago John Cagnello called on Charles Angelo who had an oyster stand in the Second District and said that he would purchase the establishment, offering \$120 in gold and \$10 in currency. The offer was accepted.

TROUBLE AMONG SAILORS.—At two o'clock Sunday morning three men went on board the British ship Siberia, head of Washington street, visited the forecabin and one of the intruders, Maurice Dalton, began kicking Hermann Hansen, a sailor, who was sleeping in a lower bunk.

LOOKS LIKE AN ATTEMPT TO KILL.—Sunday morning a policeman near the head of Toulouse street heard the report of a pistol and saw a man fall on the banquet, opposite No. 19. When the officer reached him he was insensible with two wounds in his head; one was caused by a bullet and the other by the fall, as his head struck the curbstone.

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two bits and a pair of old shoes were left behind by the thieves, which were carried to the third precinct station. The officer gave chase, firing two shots at the thief without effect. During the chase, the burglar dropped the writing desk near a lamp post. It was picked up by the officer and returned to Dr. H. H. One of the rascal's shoes, which he had taken off when he crept into the house, was left behind him and taken to the second precinct station by the officer.

About six o'clock Sunday morning, a man was discovered in St. Mary's Church, on Josephine, between Constance and Laurel streets, by the sexton and his assistant. The man on seeing them tried to conceal himself in a pew, where he was seized, and an officer summoned to arrest him. He first appeared passive, but suddenly slipped off his coat, by which he was held, and made his escape, leaving his coat, hat and a broken razor behind. The articles were taken to the sixth precinct station. It is supposed he must have concealed himself in the church all night for the purpose of robbing the contribution boxes. As nothing was missing it is supposed he found it impossible to accomplish his purpose.

About half-past eleven o'clock Sunday night, Officer Mitchell, of the second precinct discovered two colored men taking down the shutters of the show window of the shoe store of Mr. Estrop, corner of Dryades and Thalia streets. The officer, feeling satisfied that they were bent upon robbery, drew his revolver and fired at them, when one of them screamed as though he had been shot. Notwithstanding this, they both escaped, leaving no trace behind them as to their identity.

EFFECTS OF THE STORM.—Sunday morning opened sunnily, the sky clouded and sending down a drizzling rain, which continued throughout the day. There was a four-inch fall of rain. Just before dark a brisk wind added its quota of meanness, and after midnight both wind and rain let loose, as if on a regular spree, as if a mighty power held supreme sway in the wet heavens and was squeezing a volume of saturated sponges. Streets were flooded in all parts of the city, quite as badly as was ever known.

Wind from the north sent the lake water in toward the city in unusual quantities, and yesterday the waves were close up to Stern's fertilizer factory on Elysian Fields street. The little protection levee back of Luzenbourg Hospital was too weak to withstand the pressure and gave in, permitting a considerable volume of water to flow through.

The Pontchartrain railroad track was partly flooded, but the cars continued to run about on schedule time, if that has such a thing.

At the mouth of Bayou St. John the bridge was blown down and entirely ruined. The schooner H. B. Miller, not far from the lighthouse, was capsized. Fortunately the persons on board managed to escape.

Six loaded coal barges at the head of Bellechasse street went to the bottom, sinking in very deep water. One was consigned to B. Moore, some to the Southern Steamship Company, one to George Miller, and one to T. Lynn. Loss about \$19,000.

A flat boat loaded with staves, belonging to J. H. Meharty, broke from her landing at Delachaise street and floated down to the elevator, near Louisiana avenue, where it broke up. Loss \$3000.

Water in the New canal is about or nearly as high as it ever was, but no disaster is anticipated, for the levees are tolerably sound. The new abutment was overwashed up to the bend.

There was a serious break in the bank of Bayou St. John near Marigny canal, where a great quantity of water rushed through, covering that entire section.

A portion of the roof of the Second District vegetable market was blown off. The smoketack of the Melpomene draining machine went down in the gale. Shutters and awning signs without number were sent flying at eccentric tangents.

LAWS OF THE STATE OF LOUISIANA. PUBLISHED BY AUTHORITY. REGULAR SESSION OF 1876.

AN ACT No. 47. Granting to the Charity Hospital Medical College of New Orleans the right to confer degrees and grant diplomas, to have the same effect, and to confer on said Charity Hospital Medical College the same powers and privileges that are possessed by the Medical Department of the University of Louisiana.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana in General Assembly convened, That the Charity Hospital Medical College of New Orleans, a corporation regularly organized by virtue of an act for the organization of corporations for literary, scientific and other purposes, approved March 14, 1855, and by virtue of an act passed before N. B. Trist, notary public in the parish of Orleans, on the twenty-fourth day of June, 1874, shall have power and is hereby authorized to confer such degrees and issue or grant such diplomas through its faculty, as are now conferred and granted by the medical department of the University of Louisiana.

SECTION 2. Be it further enacted, that

the said Charity Hospital Medical College, of New Orleans, shall have equal privileges, proportional with the number of students, with the medical department of the University of Louisiana, or any other medical college in the State, in the Charity Hospital, or in any other State hospital, or in the State treasury, for the purpose of medical instruction.

SECTION 3. Be it further enacted, etc., That all laws or parts of laws in contravention of this act be and the same are hereby repealed. SECTION 4. Be it further enacted, etc., That this act shall take effect from and after its passage. E. D. ESTILLETTE, Speaker of the House of Representatives. C. C.
