2. That Dr. Cooper is censurable in accepting in this case, as it is too generally done by scientific experts, hearsay evidence for a basis of his opinion, and in assuming an official expert, all the evidence to be derived from a thorough post mortem examination.

3. That in this case Dr. Cooper may be deemed excusable, since the coroner, who is a physician, did, in Dr. Cooper's presence, announce that he was satisfied as to the cause of death.
