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CITY COUNCIL OFFICIAL

REGULAR MEETING.

CITY HALL, NEW ORLEANS, Tuesday, June 13, 1876.

The Council met this day at twelve o'clock M. in regular session.

Present—Hon. Charles J. Leeds, Mayor, presiding, and Administrators Bertoli, Brown, Bony, Burke, Landry, McCarthy and Pilbury.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved and their reading dispensed with.

Communications from the Mayor and Administrators.

The following message from the Mayor was received and read:

To the City Council of New Orleans, City Hall, June 13, 1876.

I return without my approval, the resolution granting permission to the New Orleans City Railroad to run steam dummies on Canal street.

On motion, the vote by which the resolution was adopted was reconsidered and the following amendment being added, "This permission to be revocable at the pleasure of the Council," the resolution as amended was adopted.

WHEREAS, By the late decision of the Hon. E. C. Billings, of the Circuit Court of the United States, various doubts have arisen as to the validity of the so-called pledge of the city of the revenues of the wharves for the payment of interest and principal of the wharf bonds;

Resolved, That from and after the first day of July next the rates of wharfage on all vessels or steamboats heretofore subject to the charge, shall be reduced fifty per cent from present rates; be it further Resolved, That this subject be referred to the committee of the whole, with power to effect a legal and satisfactory modification of the lease with the present lessees, which will effect the objects herein desired, or otherwise as they may deem proper in the contract of lease.
