Derby, foreign minister, replied that the future policy of the government would enter into no doubtful scheme. The motion was negatived.

In the House of Commons, Mr. Bruce, referring to the outrages in Bosnia, moved as the opinion of the House of Commons, that the government should attempt to secure the withdrawal of the Turkish army from the Balkans under the authority of the Porte.

Mr. Forsyth moved to amend the motion to the effect that Slavonic provinces guarantee good government irrespective of race or creed.

Mr. Gladstone favored the amendment. In his speech he censured the government respecting the Andriyevich memorandum. He hoped that the inquiry into the alleged atrocities in Bulgaria, now making would be an actual inquiry, and that Europe would act in concert. Self-government was necessary in order to bring about a solution of the difficulty.

Mr. Disraeli justified the government; he favored non-interference in the Eastern question, and he believed that the government would assist in the pacification of the provinces.

At length both the motion and the amendments were withdrawn.

A Reuter telegram from Santander says ex Queen Isabella has informed King Alfonso that she has decided to take no part whatever in the political affairs of the kingdom.

A Congress in Brussels. PARIS, August 1.—The Vienna circle, organ of the left center, says it is able to state that a European congress upon the Balkan question will be called on, and it will shortly meet at Brussels.
