Local Intelligence.

JAMES WILKINSON, MERCHANT.—Many of our readers probably remember the enterprising firm of Wilkinson & Brewer, a commission house on Gravier street that suddenly dissolved between two days, the partners vanishing like a puff of smoke. Wilkinson was afterward arrested in Louisville and held for a requisition from the Governor of Louisiana, but before Detective Pearson reached Kentucky half a dozen other claimants stood ready to seize Wilkinson on serious charges, but the New Orleans officer, after due perseverance, secured his prisoner and arrived here safely with him, last spring. Wilkinson has been in the Parish Prison ever since, failing to secure a solid bondman. When his case had grown quite cold and election matters engaged public attention, the prisoner's manipulators succeeded in finding somebody—Mr. Lacey—to sign Wilkinson's bonds, and he was released last Monday. On it being ascertained that the bondman, who lives on Priour street, was not responsible for anything like the amount he signed for, an order was issued for Wilkinson's arrest, but of course that individual was far out of reach. The police entertain a belief that this business was all a job, and of course think they know who assisted in effecting the release. Disclosures may be made in a few days, as the merchants whom accused swindlers are in hot pursuit.

THE LATEST FEMINE JOB.—Last Monday a woman visited an empty house in the First District, and after inspecting the premises expressed herself as well pleased with the place, telling the owner's wife that she would gladly take a lease. She was very agreeable and talkative, but before saying good day to the landlady she politely requested the loan of a shawl until her return. The article was produced, but the stranger has vanished, and by this time she is probably regaling herself on the proceeds of that shawl.

MOVED FROM WHERE HE DID LIVE.—Not many weeks ago a young man who was engaged in a small and unremunerative business suddenly disappeared, and his sign was taken away. A few days after the doors were "closed for repairs," one of the dealer's friends met him and inquired where he had moved his store. To the reply jerked out was, "Down to the sheriff's office." It was true, as the landlord had seized everything for rent, and the sheriff had carted the goods to his warehouse. Moved down to the sheriff's office is good.

BELLIGERENT PRINTERS.—Alfred Cahik and M. H. Ostrander were yesterday arrested at the corner of Camp and Natchez streets for threatening to unshackle the flesh and bones of J. H. Roberts. The three are printers, strangers here, and quarreled concerning a sum of money that should have been used to convey them to a distant city. Accused furnished appearance bonds.

FIREMEN FIRING UP.—Patrick Thompson and Charles Murphy, firemen on the steamboat James Howard, yesterday felt warlike and pitched into each other with apparent intent to take an eye for an eye. Thompson's head was not equal to the emergency, and he went to the deck under heavy blows dealt by Murphy. The latter, thinking he had killed his opponent, managed to escape.

MISSING MAN ACCOUNTED FOR.—Several days ago Albert Callier, an elderly man, disappeared and his friends found no trace of him until yesterday, when a dead body was found in the river head of St. Louis street. The corpse was identified as that of Callier. Deceased had been sick and was occasionally out of his mind, which induces the belief that while temporarily insane he fell into the river.

The extra Piquette last evening devoted nearly a whole column to publish thirty-three lines of what purported to be special telegrams, and the victims paid five cents for it.

Had somebody kept a list of changes that have occurred in Commercial alley during the past five years, some interesting reading might have been produced. Soldiers in uniform and without weapons walk the various streets, eight-seeing, and disturb nobody and nobody disturbs them. Our political visitors have no as yet traveled around the city much.

BATTLING THE BONDS.—Last night J. L. Maroni and James Lyons were throwing dice in Mrs. Maroni's grocery, corner of Roman and St. Louis streets. A dispute concerning a number thrown caused Maroni to draw his revolver and a bullet into the right leg of Lyons. Only one shot was fired and that one did not do much harm, and the fued ended by Maroni surrendering to a policeman. Both men will now keep their hands clean of dice for some time to come.

Mr. Lincoln's Prediction.—General Butler was congratulated upon his election to Congress by his friends in Lowell, Massachusetts, on a dispute, and in acknowledging the compliment said: "It is a singular fact to-day that, leaving out North Carolina, the question remains to be determined by Louisiana, Florida and South Carolina. If they have voted for the Republican ticket, the Republican party is again in power, the country is in the hands of friends and is rescued from its enemies; and is it not a singular fact that this country is now waiting to hear from the vote of the freedmen of the South, and that on their votes depends whether or not this country is to be delivered over to foes who will seek to rule it up if it had not been for the bravery of our boys in blue, fighting in the trenches against the very man who now seeks to rule it? We are depending now upon the negro vote precisely as we depended in the war."

"OUT OF THE JAWS OF DEATH"

The following is from the Philadelphia Press—Forney's paper—of November 11: We have no more doubt that Hayes and Wheeler have carried Louisiana, South Carolina and Florida, than that they have carried Pennsylvania and Ohio; and Pennsylvania and Ohio had been subjected to the same fraud used against the other Southern States, they would have been as certain of Tilden and Hendricks as New York city. The whole case is a nutshell. The quiet people of the North, and the fair people of the South, must be brought to their senses, and understand by wherever the government of the United States has asserted constitutional power a fair election was certain. President Grant waited for a long time before he interfered with the South, and the Democratic leaders became finally so clear that he ordered a sufficient force to secure fair play in three of the Southern States, and a young and able Secretary of War, Hon. J. D. Cameron, is executing this order with resolute perseverance. The great General Grant, the hero of the United States, William T. Sherman, has been ordered to place a sufficient additional reserve in the South to secure a fair count of the recent presidential ballot. As we said at the beginning of this article, more than half of the present Southern States belong by a fair majority of the Republican party. We have been cheated in the face of Heaven out of at least five of these States. Three of which we shall tear out of the jaws of the very furnace of rebel fraud at whatever cost, and these are Louisiana, South Carolina and Florida. The President's proclamation of yesterday are deserving of repetition here. He interposes in the South not for fraud, but for fair play, and for the sake of a country; and when he declares that "no man worthy of the office of President should be willing to hold it in a country in which the people are so grossly wronged, that neither party can afford to be disappointed in the result, but the country can not afford to have the result tainted by the suspicion of illegal or false returns," he stipulates a proceeding which is just and equitable. We demand nothing but justice in this Northern country. We submit to the gigantic frauds of New York, Jersey City, Connecticut and Indiana, *Great Britain will send her army and her navy to vindicate the rights of a single Englishman, even if this vindication bankrupts her treasury and loses her thousands of lives.* To be a man who is the proudest title on earth. "I am a Roman citizen!" was the exclamation of a Roman citizen. The Republican party of this great country is in the same predicament in this idea at whatever cost. No man, white or black, who obeys the law, whether foreigner, rebel, or the redeemed slave, can be touched in his person, property, or other man; least of all shall rebel question or abridge the right of his fellow-citizen. To this fundamental duty all the majesty of the executive, and the sanctity of the law, all deliberations and resolutions shall be organized and enforced without reference to foreign principles or powers, and unquestionably without reference to the passions of the people, whether they live in the North or in the South.

"OUT OF THE GATES OF HELL"

The most valuable time's advice that can be given to men of both parties in these hours of suspense and anxiety, is contained in two words, viz: "Keep cool." In the first place, let it not be forgotten that in the election of 1856, the Republican election here has not been successful. In Alabama and Mississippi, the colored Republican voters have been so much intimidated that the Confederate Democracy had its own way. In Louisiana, the anti-slavery agitators have been virtually nullified. The new Southern rebellion has thus succeeded as it has in Georgia. The reign of terror in Georgia and Alabama has driven the colored voters of those States into Florida, and increased the Republican vote of that refuge from oppression very considerably. Had the Republicans acted courageously and faithfully done its duty toward the colored voters of the South, the past four years, there is no chance to doubt that Mississippi and Alabama would have chosen Hayes electors yesterday. Whatever of anxiety may now be felt by Republicans as to the risk of our being cheated out of the votes of either of the three confederate States, should lead them to review the past and to inquire whether a freer fidelity to our obligations to the freedmen would not have been the best policy for the country. The Republican party that has always been successful in proportion as it has had "the courage of its opinions." South Carolina, Florida and Louisiana belong to the Republicans. That they have been at any time doubtful has been due to Democratic intimidation and violence of the party of the country. Fortunately for the peace of the country, the fraud and violence have failed to overcome the Republican majorities in these States. Had it been otherwise there would be a grave question as to the result of a new rebellion, comprising more organized and armed insurgents than were to be found in the whole South on the day of Mr. Lincoln's first inauguration. Those who want to see peace prevail and business revive, ought to be devoutly thankful that the Confederate scheme to disorganize the Southern Republicans has been foiled, and just administration of President Hayes, the freedmen will be protected, the new rebellion will die out, and peace will come to the country. It is a singular fact—that based on the universal recognition of the equal rights of all men. Any other peace would contain within itself the elements of a new rebellion, and probably of a new civil war.—New York Tribune.
